ANDOVER, N. Y., Aug. 3, 1892.

Last week Tuesday Hon. Warren B. Hooker was unanimously renominated for Member of Congress from the 84th District, at the Convention held in Olean. That Mr. Hooker has proved himself a competent and able public officer is admitted by every person who has kept himself posted on congressional matters. Of course Mr. Hooker has stood squarely with his party on every question on which party lines have been drawn. This he was expected to do. But he has done much good work from a non-partisan point of view. In securing legislation of interest to his constituents Mr. Hooker has been notably successful. An appropriation of \$20,000 was obtained by him for Dunkirk harbor and a new survey was ordered which will result in an appropriation of at least \$200,000 more. He also had ordered a survey of the headwaters of the Allegany river to prevent overflows. He had Dunkirk made a port of delivery under the immediate transportation act. His bill for a public building at Dunkirk has passed the Senate and is now awaiting the action of the House committee, while the bill for a public building at Jamestown has been so managed that it will probably become a law before this Congress adjourns. Among other measures which Mr. Hooker has been enabled to enact is one for the relief of Dr. Geo. W. Barr, formerly of Gowanda, and one granting a pension to Wells Cheney. Mr. Hooker likewise turned his attention to securing better mail services for the citizens of the 84th district, with the result that 30 new postoffices have been established and many mail routes extended. The service expedited since March 1, 1901, when his term began.

\$78,459.80, was, on June 30, 1892, only \$25,803,881.20, a decrease of \$11,084,578.60, or about one third.—Syracuse Journal.

The saloon element in the convention was united, bold and aggressive, and, supported by the railroad influence, carried its point with a uniformity that indicated a pre-arranged plan.—Union Signal.

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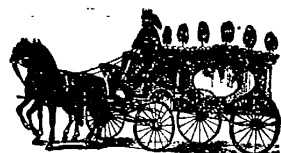
