He told his audience—in substance that the Protective tariff was an injury, because they had to buy goods either from the North or from foreign countries, the suggestion being that but for the Tariff they could buy abroad for less money than they now pay. But there is some manufacturing in Georgia, and as fast it is increased the State will gain under Protection more than it could save in imports under Free Trade. At the same time it will furnish employment to its own people, keep its money at home and draw in the money of other people.—Hartford Courant.

In Pennsylvania the Republican vote increases most in the sections where the cheap labor of Southern and Eastern Europe has been brought by labor importers. In other parts of the State the Democratic vote increases in the greater ratio.—Elmira Gazette.

If the negroes vote the Democratic ticket in the South it does not follow that the Force Bill is a dead issue.
