Erie County Must Foot the Bill.

It has been argued in some quarters that Erie county would have to reimburse the State for the expenses of the Fourth Brigade only, because the Governor had called out the remainder of the troops. But Section 94 of the Military Code provides that the National Guard while on duty or assembled therefor in pursuance to the order of a sheriff or mayor of any county or city, in case of riot, tumult, or breach of the peace, the resistance of process, or whenever called upon in aid of civil authorities, are to receive from \$1.25 to \$5 a day, according to rank, and that such compensation and the other necessary expenses incumbent upon subsisting, quartering and transporting the troops shall be audited, allowed and paid by the Supervisors of the county where the service is rendered.

This charge is to be a county charge and must be levied and raised as other county charges are levied and raised. According to an attache of the State Comptroller's office, the late unpleasantness will cost Erie county from \$30,000 to \$35,000 a day, mainly for the pay and subsistence of the troops.

New Sidewalks.

James Owen has plank for one at the side of his premises on Railroad street. On Greenwood street S. P. Robinson in front of his new house, Mrs. Atkins has the plank for one where E. D. Baker lives; J. A. Swink has one at the side of the hotel, down past the barn, and James McGinty has plank for one on Greenwood and First streets. Mrs. Everett built one in front of her premises on First street, occupied by H. R. Lee, F. Daily in front of his premises, and Stillman Burdick on the side of his place; C. M. Wood built a long piece around his place on the corner of First and West Dyke streets, occupied by Mrs. M. J. Swink and H. C. Norris; Mrs. Swink has one on each side of the vacant lot on the corner of West Dyke and Second streets; Abram Stocum has a fine one in front of his place on Second street. W. B. Hall and L. D. Bentley have built on Chestnut street. Bernard Doran has one on both sides of his place on the corner of Main and Dyke streets; M. H. Harman has made repairs in front of house occupied by D. E.
