## A. W. MINER'S WILL.

A Case That is Exciting Great Interest  
Just Now.

As was stated in the News last week,  
the contest over the Will of the late  
Asher W. Miner of Friendship, just be-  
gun, bids fair to be a long, hard fight.  
Mr. Miner left an estate valued at  
\$600,000. His bequests are as follows:  
\$25,000 given to certain charitable pur-  
poses; \$20,000 to his wife, absolutely,  
and interest on \$20,000 more, during  
her life. Also use of homestead during  
life. \$4,000 to a niece, Mrs. Harriet  
Hoxie, who had lived with Mr. Miner  
and family many years. \$10,000 each to  
Kate U. Wellman, Myra E. Corbin and  
Ella Lockwood, three women, now  
married, who were brought up by Mr.  
Miner, though never legally adopted.

No other bequests were made and it  
will be noticed that less than \$100,000  
has now been disposed of out of an  
estate of \$600,000. The contest is made  
on the final clause of the will, which is  
as follows:

"All the rest, residue and remainder  
of my estate not heretofore disposed of,  
I give, bequeath and devise as follows:  
All my household goods, furniture  
and effects, after the decease of myself  
and my wife, to Kate U. Wellman,  
Myra E. Corbin and Ella Lockwood, to  
be equally divided between them, share  
and share alike."

Mr. Miner had four brothers and two  
sisters—two brothers surviving at the  
time of his death—and many nephews  
and nieces, and this will as it stands  
does not give to a single blood relative  
even one dollar. And it is alleged by the  
contestants that it was his purpose to  
give to these the residue of his es-  
tate the names to be inserted after  
the words "as follows," in said final  
clause of the will. That would be in  
harmony with the rest of the will, and  
in harmony with expressions he is  
known to have repeatedly made while  
alive; for he was on the most friendly  
terms with all his said blood relatives,  
and had repeatedly remarked in private  
to certain of his brothers that he would  
do the right thing by his relatives in  
his will.

Three ex-Supreme Court Judges have  
been retained as counsel in the case.  
The appearances are as follows:

The Hon. ex-Judge Charles Daniels  
of Buffalo on behalf of the proponents  
as counsel for Elliott & Renwick, at-  
torneys of record, of Friendship. For  
the contestants Arthur W. Hickman  
and Charles B. Wheeler of Buffalo,  
Richardson & Robbins of Angelica and  
E. W. Chamberlain of Belmont, with  
ex-Judge James C. Smith, Canandaigua  
and ex-Judge George Barker of Fre-  
donia as counsel.
