Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged 5¢.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

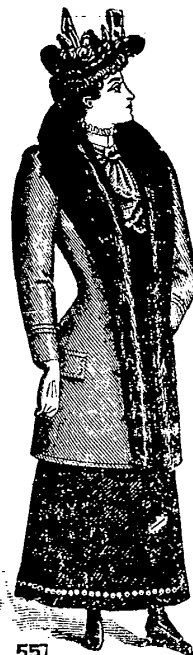
