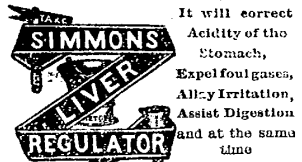

## DEATH OF JONATHAN ALLEN.

The Honored President of Alfred University Passes Away.

Rev. Jonathan Allen, D. D., LL. D., Ph. D. died at his home in Alfred Centre last Wednesday, after a two weeks' illness with heart difficulty.

We are indebted to the Alfred Star for the following account of the funeral, etc., which is condensed from this week's issue of that paper:

"The funeral services over the remains of Dr. J. Allen, President of Alfred University, were held last Friday afternoon beneath the roof of the mansion where the deceased has passed the greater portion of his life. The house and yard were completely packed with friends of the dead President, who had come to pay the last tribute of respect to a man whose name had been a household word in all parts of the country for nearly half a century, and who was loved by all the rich and the poor alike. The floral tributes were numerous and betokened the esteem in which the deceased was held by the community in which he had lived and moved. In accordance with President Allen's request, the services were simple and conducted in a very quiet manner. The services were interspersed by well selected music.

"Flags were at half mast and business was suspended during the funeral services as a mark of esteem for the deceased. All of the business places were also draped in mourning.

"After the services, the casket was placed in the hearse, and conveyed by railroad, to Buffalo, accompanied by the undertaker, Phil S. Place, and Professor A. B. Kenyon, for cremation. This method of disposing of his body was adopted by President Allen's own wish. The cremation took place at 10:30 Saturday morning, in the presence of a number of old students who live in and around Buffalo, Rev. Dr. A. J. Dardy conducting short services in the chapel connected with the crematory. Sunday noon, George G. Champlin, President Allen's son-in-law, who had gone to Buffalo previously to make necessary arrangements, returned with Prof. Kenyon and Mr. Place and the ashes were deposited in an old Greek vase of white alabaster, which was one of his most precious and dearest possessions in his museum in the Steinheim. The vase came from the Island of Cos, the country and home of Hippocrates, and once held the bones and ashes of the first king of that isle. When it came into President Allen's possession these ashes were gone, of course. It dates from 1200 B. C.

"Memorial services were held at the church Sabbath day. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and leaves, and the large portrait of the President which was suspended in front of the pipe organ, was surrounded with a wreath of roses.

"In the death of President Allen Alfred loses a prominent and influential citizen, Alfred University a loved and honored teacher, and the country a profound scholar and learned educator. His life has been so closely interwoven with this institution of learning that his name and the University were synonymous.

"He leaves, besides hosts of friends, a wife, two daughters and a son, to mourn his loss.

"The Alfred University of June, 1889, contained the following biographical sketch:

Jonathan Allen was born Jan. 26, 1823, in the town of Alfred, less than one mile west of the present site of Alfred University. The country was then new, and the log house in which the future President of Alfred University first saw the light was surrounded on all sides by dense forests. These have long since passed away and cultivated fields and comfortable homes have taken their place.

"When Alfred Academy was started in 1838, young Allen, then but thirteen years of age, was one of the first to ask admission to its classes, and was a member of its first graduating class in 1834. Remaining some three years longer as student and assistant teacher, he went to Oberlin for a year, graduating from that institution, and returned to Alfred, where he became part owner and Assistant Principal of the Academy. When it was proposed to enlarge the plan and facilities of the school, Professor Allen was one of the principal movers in that undertaking. In the winter of 1856-7, he went to Albany and secured the charter which granted to the Academy the privileges and duties of a College, with power to add a Theological and other departments as occasion might require, thus giving to the institution

a university character. One of the first acts in the process of organizing the University under its new charter, was the election of Professor Allen as its President. This honor he modestly declined, preferring to serve the school in the capacity of a teacher rather than as its head. Prof. Wm. C. Kenyon, whom no student at Alfred for the first thirty years of its history will ever forget, was elected President in his place. Prof. Allen continued to teach and to serve the institution as general and financial agent, until the ill health of Pres. Kenyon compelled him to resign in 1866, when Prof. Allen was again chosen President, in which capacity he has served uninterruptedly until the present time, a period of twenty-three years.

"Thus it will be seen that, from the beginning of the school, fifty-three years ago, until now, with the exception of two or three years Pres. Allen has been connected with the school as student, teacher and president.

"Pres. Allen is, by nature, physically a strong man, tall, broad-shouldered and well proportioned; but the strong frame shows evidence of the long and faithful years of hard work which he has performed.

"As a teacher his work has embraced, at different times, nearly all the studies in the college curriculum—mathematics, history, civics, the natural sciences, natural history, literature, rhetoric, elocution, Latin, Hebrew, metaphysics and theology—but theology and metaphysics seem best suited to his mental characteristics. His whole energy, body, mind and soul has been devoted, these many, many years, to the building up of Alfred University. Few men in this country have ever been permitted to labor so long in an institution of learning as he has labored for Alfred, or have sacrificed so much for its welfare.

"In 1873, Pres. Allen received from the Regents of the University of the State of New York the degree of Doctor of Philosophy; in 1874 or 1875, from the University of Kansas, that of Doctor of Divinity, and in 1886, from Alfred University, that of Doctor of Laws. All these honors came to him entirely unsolicited and unexpected. They are the spontaneous expression of the high regard in which he was held in these institutions, as a profound scholar, as an experienced educator and as a Christian gentleman.

"Besides the above, President Allen held the degree of M. D., conferred by the Buffalo Medical School, also a diploma from the Albany Law School.

The Friendship Fire.

We learn from the Register that the Friendship fire last week was not as bad as first reported. The Mansion House, Scott's drug store, and Waies & Wheeler's grocery were burned, but the First National Bank building was saved, though somewhat damaged. The Register says the steam fire engine did good work, but adds this paragraph:

"Water works" is the unanimous cry. By all means. The difference between loss and insurance would pay half the expense of a gravity system, but good water works pay a dividend without the aid of fire.

Perhaps there is a lesson for Andover in this loss which our neighboring village has sustained. If the fire had occurred in one of Andover's wooden blocks on Main street, at 2:45 a. m.—

We shudder to think of it—don't you?
