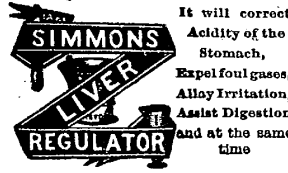

## Silver Lake Quartette.

On Sunday, Oct. 6, at 2:30 p. m. the Silver Lake Quartette and Hon. T. R. Carskadon will hold a temperance service at Prest's opera house in this village. There will be no politics in this, but plenty of temperance. Don't fail to attend this meeting.

## The Prohibition Mass Meeting.

Although the weather was unpromising, the political adherents of Bidwell and Cranfill were out in force last Thursday to listen to the eloquent Ex-Gov. John P. St. John, of Kansas, who spoke in the afternoon and gave a masterly presentation of the political situation from the standpoint of his party. Prest's opera house was crowded, and the volume of applause would seem to indicate that the Prohibitionists were largely dominant in the assemblage. A glee club from Alfred Centre added much to the interest and enthusiasm.

In the evening, Mr. John A. Nichols, of Lowell, Mass., gave an exposition of the platform and principles of the Prohibition party. Mr. Nichols is a forceful and interesting speaker and his address was favorably commented upon by his hearers of all parties, as also was Ex-Gov. St. John's.

Taken altogether, our Prohibition brethren have reason to congratulate themselves upon the success of their meeting. That our townsman, L. C. Van Fleet, Chairman of the Prohibition County Committee, has labored hard to make this and every Prohibition campaign meeting held in this county a success, goes without saying.

## The Democratic Rally.

If the other fellows had laid "the flattering unction to their souls" that our Democratic brethren were in a state of somnolence from which they would not awake until after election, the event of last evening at Prest's opera house—where the Democrats were very much "in it"—thoroughly undeceived them. The Democrats have once been disappointed in securing a speaker, and last evening the speaker advertised did not come, but the sequel proved it no disappointment, for they had a meeting in which eloquent oratory and good music aroused enthusiasm and evoked applause.

Hon Ivan Powers, of Rochester, was announced by the presiding officer, Mr. John E. Cannon—and right here, at the risk of being charged with offensive partisanship, we wish to remark that John's selection as President of the Democratic Club is a just tribute to an affable and estimable young gentleman. Mr. Powers is an interesting speaker, with fervid utterance and frequent gesticulation, and quite happy and impressive in expressing patriotic sentiment. He made an elaborate exposition and defense of Democratic principles.
