**WERE YOU ONE OF THEM?**

At last fall's election there were, in the counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Erie, Genesee, Livingston, Niagara, Orleans, Steuben and Wyoming, 38,927 voters who were registered but did not vote. In Allegany County the number of stay-at-homes was 3,092, or 26 per cent of whole number registered.

The following table shows the total registry and the total vote in each of the counties named:
