Prohibition and Temperance.
Hon. T. R. Carskadon, of West Virginia, spoke at a Prohibition meeting at Prest's opera house last Saturday afternoon. He is a plain farmer, but a good talker, and always interests his audiences.

In the evening, at the same place, there was a good crowd present to hear L. C. Van Fleet of this place. Mr. Van Fleet held the close attention of his hearers, and delivered what we call a "rattling good" Prohibition speech. He didn't abuse anybody, but gave his reasons, in a clear and forcible manner, for being a Prohibitionist. If there is but one honest believer in the political principles he defends, L. C. Van Fleet is that man.

On Sunday, at 2:30 p. m., the Silver Lake Quartette and Hon. T. R. Carskadon held a temperance service in the opera house. The house was packed to its fullest capacity, and Mr. Carskadon gave a good old-fashioned temperance sermon, in which he struck right and left, without favoring friend or foe. He has his own ideas on the liquor question, and some of them are exceedingly good. The Silver Lake Quartette sang some of their best songs in their ever-pleasing and almost perfect manner, and the service throughout was a profitable one.

A Terrible Accident.

The Elmira Advertiser says: A sad and distressing accident happened at Painted Post, one evening last week, in which Mrs. C. J. Bradbury of that place lost her life. At that time Mrs. Bradbury and her husband, the Rev. C. J. Bradbury, were coming towards the Erie station to take train 24, and in crossing the track just above the station, she caught her foot between the rails. She was trying to extricate herself and was being assisted by Mr. Bradbury when train 24 came thundering along and struck both of them. Mrs. Bradbury was instantly killed, her body being mangled into an unrecognizable mass and Mr. Bradbury was severely injured on the right arm and hand. The couple were both over 70 years of age. Mr. Bradbury is a well-known Methodist minister who recently retired from active service on account of old age and settled down for a quiet life, he and his beloved wife patiently awaiting their call to the great hereafter. Mr. Bradbury is completely prostrated with grief from the shock and it is feared serious results may follow in his case.

Teachers' Institute.

The teachers' institute held at Belmont, from Oct. 31st to Nov. 4th, had an enrolled attendance as follows: Lady teachers, 153; gentlemen, 22; and teachers' training class, 20.
Prof. Stout, the conductor, is a man who realizes the needs of teachers and conducted the sessions in a very interesting and satisfactory manner.
One of the leading features of the institute was a spelling contest for an International Dictionary. One hundred words were selected from the newspapers, and all were obliged to spell. The prize was awarded to Prin. A. J. Glennie of Bolivar, he having submitted the best paper of the public school teachers. The only perfect paper was that of Inez R. Maxson of Alfred University. But because she is not a teacher in the public schools she was not an eligible competitor. The teachers, however, showed their appreciation of Miss Maxson's merit, by framing the paper and sending it to her.—Wellsville Reporter.
