CLEVELAND ELECTED.

There is probably no doubt that Cleveland is elected President of the United States. He has carried New York State by from 30,000 to 40,000. The result in Wisconsin, Illinois and Indiana is claimed to be still in doubt, and if all three States shall finally be decided to have given Republican pluralities, there is still a possibility that Harrison may be elected. But the chances are that these States, or two of them at least, have gone for Cleveland. Unless the final result shall turn out to be entirely different from what appears now, Cleveland will be the next President.

It now appears that the United States Senate will stand 43 Republicans, 43 Democrats, 2 People's Party.

It is fortunate for the members of one party, and not so fortunate for those of the others, that Thanksgiving comes soon after election.

The new return postal card was an immediate "go," and the number of orders for them now being received from business men far exceeds the expectations of the postal officials.

The Government rain-makers—or rather the fellows on Uncle Sam's pay roll who are ambitious of becoming rain-makers—have been experimenting with some new explosives on the outskirts of Washington, much to the annoyance of nervous people, and next week they will go to the arid section of Texas and endeavor to do better than they did when expending the last appropriation made for the purpose of forcing Jupiter Pluvius to work whether he felt disposed or not. Everybody wishes they may succeed, but aside from those drawing salaries in connection with the experiments, it is difficult to find anybody who believes that they will.

The new manner of voting did not meet with great favor at Tuesday's election. It is too slow. Each voter received no less than eleven ballots, which had to be folded separately, and returned to the inspectors. Some of the voters were quite slow in picking out the tickets they wished to vote and in doing the folding. It is not reasonable to suppose they could be otherwise, and the result was that, in many places, long lines of voters stood for hours waiting for an opportunity to receive their ballots. The new system had never been fully tested before, because it has never been in operation at a Presidential election, or when a number of Constitutional Amendments were to be voted upon. An amendment of some kind is needed to facilitate matters. Just what it should be is a matter of varying opinion. The Buffalo Express suggests one as follows:

"There is one amendment to the present law which ought to meet no objection. The requirement that the ballots not voted must be folded and returned to the clerk is more annoying, causes more delay and is more useless than any other feature of the law. If there is any sensible reason why the voter should not be allowed to throw these ballots into a waste basket himself, the Express never heard of it. Or, if it is thought the voter might put them in his pocket to prove how he voted, he should be allowed to hand them unfolded to the ballot-clerk, who should throw them in a waste-basket."
