**Thanksgiving Dinner.**

Of course everybody is invited, and it is hoped everybody will be there.

**Sad Tragedy in Caneadea.**  
One of the saddest and most distressingly peculiar circumstances that it has ever been our lot to publish, occurred Monday evening last on Cronk Hill in the town of Caneadea. This was the accidental shooting of Forrest Arnold, son of Marion Arnold, by his uncle, Alfred Arnold.  
The particulars of this sad affray are about as follows: The boy, together with several other boys of the neighborhood, had been in the habit of annoying some of the members of Mr. Arnold's family by peeping in the windows at bedtime. They had been repeatedly warned against this, but it seems failed to heed the warning.  
On Monday evening, between eight and nine o'clock, a noise was heard outside by Alfred's daughters and they informed their father. He seized his gun with the intention of firing it off to frighten the boys, and went out doors for that purpose. He saw someone, and holding the muzzle of the gun in the air, pulled the trigger. The weapon, which was a rifle, "hung fire," and supposing it was not going off, Mr. Arnold lowered it upon his arm, when it discharged; the bullet, most singularly, found a lodging place in young Arnold's body. He was climbing the road fence when the shot was fired, and he fell upon his face to the ground, as bruises on his temple and cheek indicated.

Mr. Arnold went to him and asked if he was hurt. He answered "yes," and when asked if he should go and get his father, the boy again answered "yes." When the father arrived, he living but a short distance away, on the adjoining farm, Forrest was dead.  
The bullet had struck him in the back, on the left side of the spinal column, and passed through his body and broken the skin of the right breast. It had lodged just under the skin and was found to be flattened considerably. It must have penetrated the heart or have passed very near it.  
As it was quite dark when the fatal shot was fired so that it was but just barely possible to distinguish the figure of a person a few rods away, the doubt cannot be entertained that the killing of the boy was anything but accidental. If aim had been taken, the chances would be a thousand to one that he would not have been hit.  
The uncle was terribly distracted over the awful tragedy, and for a time it was feared his mind would be wrecked. It was a very sad affair, and one from which many people can take warning, both as to the indulgence of children and the handling of firearms.

The boy was just seventeen years of age. The funeral was held Wednesday at the Cronk school house, the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Bogart of the Home Baptist church. The building was too small for the large number of people who came to attend the funeral.—*Fillmore Observer.*

**A Finnish Act.**  
A dispatch from Bradford, Pa., dated Sunday, says: This afternoon a tramp giving his name as Anthony Hanlon or Quinn took shelter in a small shanty on the bank of the Tuna Creek, near the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburg R. R. shops, used by the small boys in the neighborhood as a play-house. A number of boys were playing around the shanty and requested the tramp to get out. This enraged the tramp, who seized a pail of crude oil and threw it on John Leggett, aged 14. It is alleged that he then set fire to the boy's clothes. Young Leggett was frightfully burned all over the body, his face and head being simply cooked. The villain was captured and is now in the lockup. Young Leggett died to-night, after lingering for hours in great agony.
