Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

## Improvements in the School Building.

The recent improvements made in our school building have been a long-felt want. For the last two years pupils in the Academic Department have been obliged to recite in a poorly ventilated, ill-lighted and ill-warmed hall, passing through the building between the upright and new addition. To provide better quarters for the pupils, and also to afford more room for our rapidly growing school, the Board of Education has moved the partition between the hall and addition, sixteen feet to the east; thus making a commodious Junior Department of the west room, while the east room has been fitted with all the necessary appliances for a first-class laboratory and recitation room.

This improvement, together with the excellent collection of books and apparatus, recently purchased, places Andover Union School on a par with any of its kind in the country. The school has always had a first-class record and now that it is so much better equipped for giving instruction, parents will do well to consult our Principal before sending their children elsewhere.
