His Wife Made Him Div.

A great many couples come into New York state from Pennsylvania to get married, because they can get spliced here without taking out a marriage license, which they can't do in Pennsylvania. To even the matter up, a great many married people go from New York state to Pennsylvania to get divorces, because the divorce laws of that state are not nearly so strict as they are here. Recently the New York Sun contained a letter from Potter county, Pa., giving the history of a few of the more prominent divorce cases pending in that county. The letter says: "A case now pending is brought by a well-to-do and prominent resident of Allegany county, N. Y., the incompatibility of temper of whose wife (his third one) with his own is such that he seeks legal separation from her. She was a widow with three children when he married her. He had children by former marriages. The principal charge he makes to sustain his complaint is, that recently, after family prayers, his wife charged him with having prayed for his own children and neglected to intercede for her's in his devotions. He does not deny the charge, but makes affidavit that the discussion over the subject became warm, and that his wife ordered him to repeat the family services and make special mention of her children in his prayer. He at first refused to do her bidding, and she grabbed him by the hair with both hands, pulled him down on his knees and refused to release her painful hold on his hair until he had prayed as she ordered him to. For this evidence of incompatibility of temper he prays the Court for release from his marriage bonds." The probability is that the prayer didn't get higher than the roof of the house.
