What is religion doing to a New York Thanksgiving Day dispatch says: "Calvary Baptist church in West 57th street was bare of decorations on this holiday for the first time. Its pastor, Rev. Dr. McArthur, had made a bet with one of the congregation by which if Harrison was elected the church was to be decorated at the said member's expense and in the most lavish style. If Harrison was defeated, the Doctor was to preach on Thanksgiving Day in a church destitute of decoration. And so it was, except the yellow and black Princeton colors on the lapels of the ushers' coats." The Salvation Army isn't "in it" with the New York Calvary Baptist church members.

Last week the Grand Jury found indictments against Mrs. Ella M. Rumpff of the Angelica *Every Week* and G. W. Fries of the *Friendship Register*. The charge against these editors is that of criminal libel. During the late campaign they said harsh things about District Attorney Brown, charging him with various offenses both in public and private life. The indicted parties each pleaded "not guilty" and gave \$500 bail for appearance at trial. Only two editors so far as we are aware, have ever been previously indicted in this county. They were Enos W. Barnes of the *Wellsville Reporter* and A. N. Cole of the *Genesee Valley Free Press*, and they both died out of jail. Mrs. Rumpff and Mr. Fries have illustrious company in their woe—or joy as they may term it, for we understand they intend to get full value for all penalties inflicted, with costs, in advertising. Mrs. Rumpff has, we understand, retained the law firm of Richardson & Robbins to defend her, and Mr. Fries will probably secure equally eminent counsel. We wouldn't give much for the complimentary notices the District Attorney will get in the future from these papers. Once upon a time—quite recently in fact—a paper in this county was "giving it" to a candidate for office, who made the remark: "Some of my friends think I ought to get the editor of that paper indicted, but I'm not a d—d fool."

A MIDWINTER ELECTION.

Unless the coming Legislature shall change an existing law, the electors of New York State will be called upon to participate in a mid-winter election. On the 14th of February a general election will occur and members of the constitutional convention, which meets in Albany next May to revise the State constitution, will be chosen. In speaking of this election the *Albany Journal* says: "It will be conducted in the same manner as the presidential election. The appointment of inspectors, ballot clerks and poll clerks will be necessary. There will be the regular number of registration days. Doubtless there will be five party tickets in the field, as at the recent election. The convention will consist of 168 delegates, of whom 128 will be elected by Assembly districts and 32 at large, while eight will be appointed by the Governor."
