The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

A distinguished Englishman gave as the thing seen in America most unlike what was to be seen in England, "The wineless dinner tables of the great middle class."

Two young girls from Japan are now enrolled among the nurses in training at the National Temperance hospital in Chicago. Both are graduates of a Japanese college, and desire to perfect themselves in the knowledge of nursing and non-alcoholic remedies.

It would need six hundred years to send a Bible to each inhabitant of the globe, at the present rate of progress; the drink bill would enable us to do it in six months.

In ten years, Russia produced eight hundred million gallons of pure alcohol. The twenty million bushels of grain used for this would have prevented the terrible famine and pestilence which has devastated that country.

The *Southern Journal* says: There is a great hue and cry that if women could vote that bad women would all rush to the polls and the good women would not vote. Here is an object lesson: The convicts in the two Kentucky penitentiaries have just been counted, and it is found that there are now 1,340 convicts that have to be supported by the State. Of this number twenty six are women, six white women and twenty colored, and 1,314 men. According to these statistics, gotten up by them themselves, there are fifty-one men and seven-thirtieths of a man to every one woman. Now, we suggest if the men voters will take care of the 1,314 bad men, the women will agree to take care of the twenty-six women, and we think the masculines will have a bigger contract on their hands than the women. As there are fifty-one bad men in Kentucky to every one bad woman, the State would be in no danger from the votes of the women, but it certainly is in danger now from the thousands of bad men who surge through the saloons and gambling dens to the ballot box and no moral power to offset their votes, which are sold out to the distillers and brewers who manipulate the politics of the State. No, the danger is not from bad women, but from bad men. We were always glad we were born a woman, but we are really delighted since reading the statistics above.

He had been ill for some time with a complication of diseases. His age was 61 years. The funeral services were held to-day at 2 o'clock p. m. in the Presbyterian church in this place.

FIRE IN WHITESVILLE.
Our Correspondent Tells All About It—Other News.

WHITESVILLE, N. Y. Dec. 12.
Our people were startled to hear the fire bell sounding about 12:30 a. m. Sunday morning. The store owned by N. S. Bartlett and occupied by J. B. Wiley as a furniture store and H. Mourhess of Andover as a jewelry and repair store, was a solid sheet of flames in the lower story when discovered. We soon found out that the furniture store could not be saved. Then the only thing we could hope to do was to save the store and dwelling owned by Prof. A. D. Howe, which was only three feet from the burning building. The fire boys did their whole duty and succeeded in saving Howe's building, notwithstanding the roof was nearly burned from the store. Willing hands moved the goods from the Alliance store, and also from Howe's dwelling. The loss to N. S. Bartlett was about \$1400, partially insured in the Allegany Co. Mutual. J. B. Wiley's loss was about \$1500, partially insured. H. Mourhess' loss was about \$250, partially insured. This is the third time our water works has saved to our village property amounting to as much as the whole system cost.
