A very determined effort will be made this winter to have the legislature repeal the section of the penal code relative to the infliction of the death penalty and have adopted in its stead a life imprisonment section as the severest penalty for murder in the first degree. Some of the strongest advocates of abolition of the death penalty are returned to the legislature this year, and it is intimated by those who intend to press the matter that Governor Flower is not averse to its adoption and in fact favors it.

**The women of the Political Equality clubs of Chautauqua county** have begun an active campaign to secure to women the right to vote for delegates to the coming Constitutional Convention and also the right to vote upon the acceptance or rejection of the work of that body. Gov. Flower is to be deluged with letters urging him to recommend this action in his forthcoming message to the Legislature. The law-makers will also be appealed to. If the women of this State take advantage of the opportunity which will be given them next fall to vote for school commissioner, and show beyond question that there is a general demand from their sex to be allowed to vote, it will not be five years before women will share the election franchise equally with men.

Little has been heard recently about the Koch consumption cure which was, a couple of years ago, advertised to such an extent, and which was claimed to perform wonderful cures, only to fall into disrepute after repeated experiments had been made with it. But experiments have gone steadily forward until it is now claimed that the lymph has been freed from the elements which caused it to produce certain unfavorable symptoms, and that its use is no longer dangerous to health, but on the contrary it is being used with satisfactory results in many cases. It will be remembered that Dr. Koch did not make the exaggerated claims for his lymph which were somehow attributed to him. He said the curative qualities of the medicine were yet in doubt, but stated that he thought further experiment and research would develop something which would be of great benefit to mankind. Instead of taking him at his word, the people assumed that the lymph was already perfect, and that it would cure consumption in almost any stage. The recent developments seem to indicate that the opinion expressed by the Doctor had some foundation. While it is not possible, perhaps, that a cure will ever be discovered for consumption in its last stages, it is within the range of probabilities that the disease may be arrested in its incipient form, and that those who have a strong tendency to the disease, and who would, without treatment, surely be finally overcome by it, may, by a proper course of treatment and proper care of themselves, successfully eliminate the germs from their systems. This is probably all that can be hoped for, but it is a great deal, and may give new hope to thousands of persons who know that they are liable to die with the dread disease.
