At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

Died at Canisteo N. Y., Dec. 13, 1892, at 8:30 p. m., Paul E. Benton, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. H. Benton. His age was six months. The remains were brought to Andover for burial.

Norma Davis, son of W. H. Davis, who formerly resided in Andover, died in Colorado, Dec. 11th. The deceased was superintendent of the Murdock mines and met with an accident on Dec. 8 which caused his death. He was 23 years old.

L. H. Kingsbury, President of the Dedham (Mass.) National Bank, died Dec. 9 as the result of injuries received by being struck by a runaway horse in Boston. Not many people now living in Andover will remember that Mr. Kingsbury once lived in this town, but he was in fact one of the earliest pioneers of this section. He came here with his brothers Amherst and Caleb Kingsbury and his brother-in-law, Asa N. Allen, about the year 1830. He was the younger of the two sons to whom he inherited the town name. He left here about 1835.

Last Saturday was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Freeborn, and their relatives and friends made them a surprise visit that evening. They brought a handsome easy chair as a token of remembrance. Everybody had a good time and congratulations were plentiful.

Dehorning Cattle.

The dehorning of cattle is something which has for some time received considerable attention from stock raisers in various sections of the country, but so far as we know nothing in this line has ever been done in the town of Andover. In the towns of Angelica, West Almond, Belfast, Cuba, Friendship and other places in this county, large numbers of cattle have been dehorned, and a cow with horns is a rare sight in some neighborhoods. In every instance the results have been most satisfactory, as can be easily ascertained by any person who chooses to take the trouble.

Mr. A. J. Bennett of Bennetts, Allegany county, N. Y., is at present in Andover dehorning cattle. He is an expert in the business, having dehorned upwards of 1500 head this fall, with no bad results in any case. Those who have held doubts as to the humaneness of the process are easily convinced that there is no cruelty connected with it, in fact the dehorned animal does better in every way after being dehorned. All the principal dairymen in the county advocate dehorning. Since Mr. Bennett has been in this vicinity he has dehorned cattle for the following persons: E. F. Stearns, W. H. Church, E. B.
