The village of Wyoming, in Wyoming County, was visited by the most severe fire in its history Monday morning. The fire broke out in a bakery at 5:30 o'clock, and before its course could be stayed it had burned the Methodist Episcopal church, six stores, seven dwellings, and three barns. The village was entirely without fire protection. Finally a building was blown up with gunpowder and the fire was stopped. Nine families are left homeless. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.
