The court house and jail at Angel ica are to be sold at public auction sale January 5th. Within a few days after the sale takes place, a decision will probably be rendered by the General Term of the Supreme Court in the case brought by citizens of the Northern District of this county to test the legality of the proceedings under which the new jail was built at Belmont. If the decision of the court is to the effect that those proceedings were legal, all will be well; but if an adverse decision is rendered, serious complications may arise, and it may be nesessary to undo a great deal that has been done. If the General Term decides in favor of Angelica, the case will probably be taken to the Court of Appeals, but if the Court sustains the action already taken, the matter will probably be dropped forever, and Angelica will fall to the level of other towns in having simply a Deputy Sheriff, in place of what she has hitherto bad in the way of Sheriff, Jailer, Jail, etc. It is doubtless quite generally expected that the General Term will decide that all that has been done in regard to the new jail has been legally done, but it isn't safe to speculate much on the decision of any court, and the decision will probably be looked for with considerable interest.

The Colony for Epileptics.

The Craig colony for epileptics con sits of 1.856 acres of land, near Mt.
Morris, in Livingston county. New
York. There are 40 buildings, being
put in order for the accommodation of patients. The colony was named for Oscar Craig, late president of the State Oscar Craig, late president of the State Board of Charities. The law establish-ing Craig Colony was passed in the spring of 1894. The object of the colony is to provide for the four great needs of epileptics: Give them schools where they may attain any degree of educathey may attain any degree of educa-tion, provide industrial training of all kinds, give them a home, when all other doors are closed to them and see that each and every case is carefully studied and treated by the best scientific methods the world affords. Such objects can only be attained in a community, village or colony, devoted to this par ticular class of cases. There are sever ticular class of cases. There are sever al such colonies in Europe, but none in this country and there are 600 epileptics in the alms houses of New York and 400 in the state insane asylum. The colony is intended to provide for most of these. The lew will not permit of any private The law will not permit of any private parties being admitted until all the patients upon public charge are provided for in the colony. It is hoped to open the colony for the reception of a hund red or more patients in the summer of 1895. It is probable that the colony will ultimately number from 1,500 to 2,000 members, and it is certain to become in the course of time, a self-sup porting industrial and agricultural vil


