The new compulsory education law went into effect January 1. Its provisions are very strict and children between the ages of eight and fourteen must now go to school. Parents will be liable who do not comply with the law, and the measures to be taken for carrying out the provisions of the law are such that good results are reasonably sure to follow.

The complete returns of the vote on the Canal-improvement amend ment have been tabulated in the office of the Secretary of State, and they show some surprising results. In the Constitutional Convention, Mr. Alvord, of Onondaga said that such an amendment would be lost in his county by over 10,000. It was carried by over 3,000. New York car ried it by over 32,000, Kings by 20, 000, Albany by 500, Monroe and Westchester by over 4,000, Oswego by over 3,000, and Rensselser by over 1,000. Even non-canal counties carit, like Chautauqua by 2,500, Chenan go and Tompkins by 500, Cortland and St. Lawrence by 300, Steuben by 1,600, and Wyoming by 600. Among the counties that voted against 'it were Allegany 1,500, Chemung 700, Deleware 100, Jefferson 800, Livings ton 150, Ontario 400, Otsego 900, Schuyler 250, Tioga 400 and Yates The official majority in favor was 115,343.
