There are men who pray like this: "O Lord, make the other fellows give up their railroad passes, but let me keep mine."

The Governor of Florida will deliver the Standard Oil magnates to the Texas authorities just as he prevented the Corbett-Mitchell fight. That is, he won't do it.

Common sense is on the increase. Among the theatrical ventures which have failed this season are the company that starred the two green-goods men and the John L. Sullivan aggression.

Governor Rich of Michigan thinks he has discovered the solution of the labor question. In his inaugural address he says: "Under the existing circumstances it would seem to be the part of wisdom and justice to provide for the organization of corporations of labor with as much power and with no greater liability than is imposed on corporations of capital. Create them as a body corporate, which may make contracts and enforce them, and be empowered to sue and be sued, and, in short, to do anything they may be authorized to do in the articles of incorporation. This would place them on an equality, and difficulties between capital and labor would be settled as other difficulties and disagreements are settled through the courts."

A dispatch from Albany says the operation of the anti-pass provision in the new Constitution is observable about the Capitol buildings and hotels. Although the Legislature adjourned Friday until Monday evening, many members were about the legislative hall Saturday. This was not so when railroad passes were in use. Many of the members have favorably discussed the question of passing a law empowering the Secretary of State to issue railroad passes to all State employees when on public business, the same as is now done for the employees of the State Railroad Commission. One appreciated result of the anti-pass provision is that it relieves the members from the necessity of insuring the enmity of constituents, as has heretofore been the case when requests for passes were not speedily attended to. The number of letters received by the more prominent members of the Legislature is only half as large this year as in former times.

Commodore Elbridge T. Gerry, the president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, through Senator O'Connor, has introduced in the Legislature a bill to re-establish the whipping post as a punishment for a certain class of offenders. This move was agreed up on at the recent convention of the Society held in Albany.

The measure provides that when a man has been convicted of a felony which consists of or includes the infliction of pain on another, the court, in addition to the penalty now prescribed by law, may order him to be whipped. The sentence shall fix the number of strokes, not more than 40, which shall be given with "a whip or a lash of suitable proportions and strength for the purpose." The whipping shall be administered in prison in the presence of a warden and a physician, and of no other person. The proposed law is intended to check the crimes against helpless children. Commodore Gerry is not a cruel man; on the contrary, his life is devoted to work which is the opposite of cruel; but he is convinced that no other way of protecting children from brutalities exists, and he is thoroughly acquainted with the sub-

ject. Comfortable imprisonment, he says, is not a proper deterrent, and he proposes to appear before a committee of the Legislature and prove that it is not.

A meeting of the Allegany County Publishing Association, held at Bolivar, April 23, 1892, resolved that the following rules were unanimously adopted to govern the work beginning May 9, 1892: That no less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices, and that all notices from which revenue is to be derived, shall be charged as follows:—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 2 cents per line.
