### His Step Mother Pays His Debts.

W. J. Penny and Charles S. Davis are the executors of the will of Mrs. Abbey C. Cole, who died recently in Cuba. The Cuba Patriot last week gave some interesting facts in connection with this will. The paper says the document gives \$1,000 to the Baptist church at Friendship, \$500 to the Cuba cemetery, and after making several other bequests, provides as follows:

"The residue of my estate I give and bequeath to my executors in trust for the following purposes: To pay such debts of my step-son, Sanford S. Cole, as remain unpaid, which he owed at the time he made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors in January 1878, to be paid in full after deducting all payments theretofore made, whether barred by the statute of limitations or not, the debts with simple interest at six per cent., but not to pay any costs or expenses whatever, and I prefer that such persons and cheese factories be paid first as made my husband, John B. Cole, the least trouble at the time of Sanford's assignment and settlement." There are several cheese factories and business firms in the towns of Andover and Independence who are creditors of the late Sanford S. Cole. Some of the creditors, including those in this vicinity, assigned their claims, and the Patriot says there is likely to be a contest as to whether this bequest is intended for the benefit of the original claimants or of the assignees.

### Joint Meeting at Whitesville.

The Y. P. S. C. E. and the Independence Sunday School Association will hold a joint meeting in the Town Hall in Whitesville on Sunday Feb. 10th, 1895, afternoon and evening. The Y. P. S. C. ### Meeting of the Publishers.

The Allegany County Publishers' Association held its regular meeting in Belmont last Friday. The meeting was largely attended, very few members of the Association being absent. Various matters of interest to the craft were discussed. A committee was appointed to take in charge the matter of providing a suitable demonstration in honor of the press at the Centennial Celebration to be held in Wellsville June 19 and 20, and it is safe to say the newspapers of this county, past and present, will be appropriately represented.

After the business meeting had been adjourned, the publishers, by invitation of Sheriff Geo. H. Swift, repaired to the new county jail, where a short time was spent in examining the interior of the new structure, which, contrary to some reports that have been put into circulation, seems admirably adapted to the use for which it was intended, and is apparently large enough to accommodate all who may be placed within its walls. Considerable less than one-half of the cell-room is now occupied. As to the rooms provided for the official in charge and his family, under Sheriff Hodnett declares that it is ample, and if he doesn't complain no one else should. So far as we could discover there is plenty of room in the building, everything is as neat as wax, and Allegany county has a well built, comfortable jail, at a small cost.

After the inspection had been concluded, the newspaper men, with a few others, were invited to the family dining room, where they partook of a repast provided under the direction of Mrs. Swift and Mrs. Hodnett. Those present fully appreciated the courtesies shown by the Sheriff and his wife, and the time passed most agreeably until train time.

### Died.

Daniel A. Scribner died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. A. Pease, in the town of Greenwood, on Monday, Feb. 4, 1895, aged 80 years. He had been in failing health for some time, but was confined to his bed only a few days. He had long been a resident of this town, and was well known throughout this section. He leaves a widow, three sons and one daughter—L. D. Scribner, S. S. Scribner, Mrs. R. A. Pease and J. C. Scribner.

Funeral services were held today at the home of Mr. Pease. Rev. J. M. Leach officiating.
