The Democrats will hardly miss the loss of their majority in the Senate, so far as legislation is concerned.

Japanese diplomacy seems to be of the same brand as her fighting. China's tricky peace negotiations were flatly turned down.

Things must have changed in New York. A policeman actually reported an attempt to bribe him. But the amount offered was only \$4.

Nothing would please the railway managers more than to see a fight to the death between the organizations composed of railway employees. Yet, there are railway employes trying to bring on just that sort of a fight.

Things would seem to be getting somewhat mixed when bankers act in such a manner, concerning the gold in their vaults, that ordinary men cannot tell whether it is patriotism or a spirit of speculation that moves them.

If Congress turns its back upon all proposed labor legislation, except that providing for the publication of an official bi monthly bulletin showing the condition of labor at home and abroad, it will certainly be a case of asking for bread and receiving a stone, as far as the labor organizations are concerned.

A few years ago it was said by certain scientists that the seasons had materially changed and we were to have no more "old fashioned" winters. It appears now that the seasons have changed back again, and instead of stopping in the old notch, the wheel has slipped a few cogs further toward the cold weather point.

It seems altogether odd to those who read his testimony in the Pollard case that Col. Breckinridge should get so all-fired mad over being called a liar. But, after all, it is not surprising that he should be in fighting humor. Most of men would be after having failed as a lecturer, been cut by good society, and kicked out of Congress.

Hon. J. Sterling Morton, secretary of agriculture, thinks the free seed distribution undertaken by the United States government costs too much for the benefit it confers, and no doubt it does. Last year 9,555,318 packages of seed were scattered to their constituents by senators and representatives. Mr. Morton says that all except one-tenth of these contained flower and vegetable seeds, and were thus of comparatively little value to the great wheat, corn and cotton farmers of the country.

Charles R. Skinner of Watertown, who was deputy superintendent of public instruction under Andrew S. Draper, has been appointed Superintendent of Public Instruction. Mr. Skinner has had long experience in the office and is well equipped to fill the duties acceptably. He has been so useful in the department that when Superintendent Crooker came into office he was compelled to retain Mr. Skinner, although a Republican, in order to properly administer the details of the department.

The mileage of members of Congress costs the government \$130,000 a year. Precious little of this goes to the railroads, as the members travel on passes. Mileage is allowed at the rate of ten cents a mile, going and coming, between the member's home and Washington. This is an absurd allowance even if the members were required as they are not to "settle" for their rides. The California members, for instance, draw \$600 for mileage each session, although a round-trip ticket can be

bought at \$175. This is one of not a few little "steals" that the government has long permitted to be perpetrated upon itself. The mileage rates will stand a pretty large pruning.

Senator Higgins has introduced a preamble and resolution in the State Senate requesting our Representatives and Senators in Congress to use their best endeavors to pass a bill through Congress, directing the Treasurer of the United States to pay to the Comptroller of the State of New York annually all sums equivalent to three-fourths of all sums expended or incurred by the State of New York in the maintenance of the Erie canal system during the year last preceding. This is on the ground that the said canal, from its location, between the Hudson and the lakes, is largely, in fact mainly used for international commerce purposes. The general Government clearly ought to assist in its enlargement and care.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Hollister, April 23, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892: Rule 1. - That not less than a cent per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of funerals or entertainments from which revenue is to be derived. Rule 2. - Cards of thanks to be charged \$1. Rule 3. - Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and those of well-known persons to be charged for a not less than a cent per line.
