Ten thousand negroes are being transported from the United States to Mexico to work on coffee plantations. This may save them from being lynched.

Just previous to last fall's election the noted infidel Bob Ingersoll said: "When Missouri goes Republican I will believe in a hell!" The State went Republican, but whether Mr. Ingersoll changed his mind as he said he would is not stated. Probably not.

A bill providing for the removal of the capitol from Albany to New York will soon come before the Legislature. Now that their railroad passes have been taken from them many legislators may vote for it, as New York is a much pleasanter place than Albany in which to spend Sunday. It is not stated whether it is proposed to take along the new capitol building or start a new one.

Steuhen county will have a chance to celebrate her centennial next year. The county was erected from Ontario county on March 8, 1796.

Since its first organization its territory has been materially lessened. A portion was attached to Allegany county in 1808, a portion to Ontario county in 1814, a portion to Yates county in 1824 and another part to Schuyler county in 1850. Nevertheless, it remains one of the largest and most important counties of the state. Steuhen was named in honor of Frederick William Augustus Henry Ferdinand von Steuhen, a Prussian soldier who had been an aid to Frederick the Great and who had made a brilliant record in the Seven Years' War. It is proposed to further honor his memory. Senator McMahon has introduced a bill appropriating \$25,000 for the erection of a monument to be unveiled in the centennial year.

William V. Averell, William Runsey, Frank Campbell, Ira Davenport, Stephen T. Hayt, Charles W. Gillett, Milo M. Acker, John F. Parkhurst and George J. Magee are appointed a commission to procure the statue and to supervise the erection thereof. The bill also provides that the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Speaker of the Assembly shall be members of the commission.

THE POPE'S ENCYCLICAL.

We have been much interested in reading the letter issued by Pope Leo XIII to American prelates, which was made public a short time ago. It is a document which may be read by every person with benefit. We admire particularly the portion of the address dealing with the duties of citizens, which we print below:

"As regards civil affairs, experience has shown how important it is that the citizens should be upright and virtuous. In a free state, unless justice be generally cultivated, unless the people be repeatedly and diligently urged to observe the precepts and laws of the gospel, liberty itself may be pernicious. Let those of the clergy, therefore, who are occupied with the instruction of the multitude treat plainly this topic of the duties of citizens, so that all may understand and feel the necessity in political life of conscientiousness, self-restraint and integrity, for that cannot be lawful in public which is unlawful in private affairs. On this whole subject there are to be found, as you know, in the encyclical letters written by us from time to time in the course of our pontificate many things which Catholics should attend to and observe. In these writings and expositions we have treated of human liberty, of the chief Christian duties of civil government and of the Christian constitution of States, drawing our principles as well from the teaching of the Gospels as from reason. They, then, who wish to be good citizens and to discharge their duties faithfully may readily learn from our letters the value of an upright life. In like manner let the priests be persistent in keeping before the minds of the

people the enactments of the Third Council of Baltimore, particularly those which inculcate the virtue of temperance, the frequent use of the sacraments and the observance of the just laws and institutions of the republic."
