At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Holtzlar, April 29, 1894, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1894:
RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged at.
RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding announcements to be charged for at; not less than 5 cents per line.
