NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

The Erie is building an immense stock-barn at Hornellsville which will be used as a place for feeding east-bound stock.

The women's prize of \$300 at the Jordan Art Exhibition in Boston, has been won by Miss S. Mary Norton, by her picture of the "Kindergarten for Poor Children." Miss Norton formerly lived in Belmont, and is a sister of James E. Norton, at one time owner of the Post at that place.

Frank Walker of Angelica, walked out of Auburn prison a free man last week Wednesday. He was convicted of forgery and sentenced to six years and nine months and had served four years and five months. It was discovered that he was not guilty and D. P. Richardson secured his release.

James Wight of Jamestown, who has been confined in the county-house at Dewittville, Chautauqua county, was taken violently insane a few nights ago and ran away from the home. His absence was soon discovered and he was tracked in the snow to the lake, across it and found in the woods near Chautauqua, where he must have perished had assistance not reached him soon. On being taken back to the institution from which he had escaped he knocked one of the attendants down and succeeded in getting hold of an ax, creating great excitement before it was finally taken away from him. He was taken to the insane asylum at Buffalo.

Representative W. B. Hooker introduced in the House last week a private pension bill somewhat different from the usual bills of that character. It provides a pension of \$72 a month for John H. Crandall, ex-postmaster of Bolivar and ex-supervisor of the town of Little Genesee. This pension is petitioned for by 300 citizens of Bolivar and Belmont, who state in the petition that Mr. Crandall has broken down mentally and physically, is confined to his bed and requires the services of a regular attendant, is without means and has a wife and three young children dependent upon him. Mr. Crandall served during the whole period of the late War in the 27th and 136th New York Volunteers.

Hornellsville lays claim to a man who will in a short time come into possession of \$500,000, owing to the death of a brother. A short time ago, there was published in papers all over the United States the following: "W. A. Spencer, postmaster at Gibson, is trying to procure information that will lead to the whereabouts of some of the members of the family of John McCaffrey, who lived in Corning between the years of 1840 and 1850. He owned and ran a canal-boat and plied between Corning and the old Chemung Canal. Mr. McCaffrey was thus employed for several years, and was also engaged in building boats, at which trade he was very handy. He died in Chicago last June, and left an estate worth half a million of dollars." The above notice came to the hands of Patrick McCaffrey of Hornellsville, who turns out to be a brother of John McCaffrey, and he has placed his claims in the hands of Judge Clancy, and will go at once to Gibson, and later will go on to Chicago. Patrick McCaffrey has lived in Hornellsville for years, and is a man who has never enjoyed the luxuries of life. He will not receive the property without a contest, however, for there is a man at Big Flats, Chemung county, who claims to be the son of John McCaffrey. The Big Flats man is not named McCaffrey, but nevertheless claims that the deceased man by that name was his father.
