#### OTHER TOWNS.

In Independence the whole Republican ticket was elected except Justice of the Peace and Collector. The town went no license, without opposition.

In Alfred the whole Republican ticket was elected by large majorities. The proposition to bond the town for \$3,000 to macadamize the road from Alfred to Alfred Station, was carried by five majority.

In Wellsville the whole Republican ticket was elected except long term Justice. The town went against license by 136 majority.

Belfast, Cuba and Angelica are the only towns heard from which went for license.
