### Over the River.

Died, at his residence in the town of Almond, March 6th, 1895, Daniel P. Stillman. He was born Jan. 15th, 1812, and was consequently over 83 years of age. On June 16th, 1836, he married Fanny M. Potter, of Hartsville, and immediately moved to the farm where the remainder of his life, nearly fifty-nine years, was passed. Three children were born to him: Elisha P. of Almond; Dr. Edwin M., of this village, and Horace G. of Almond. Mr. Stillman's was the first death to occur in the family so long ago established. Deceased was always a man of the most exemplary morals and habits. He was widely known, universally respected, and had repeatedly been the recipient of public office at the hands of his townsmen. Primarily his last sickness was pneumonia, but from this he so far rallied as to be thought out of danger, and the immediate cause of his death was heart failure. The funeral services were held on Friday, Rev. B. C. Davis of Alfred, officiating. The News tenders sincere condolence to the bereaved ones.
