TENDER MEAT.

the choicest cuts of beef are miserably tough and to make them palatable require different treatment in cooking from the tenderloin part of the same steak? Would it not be practicable for the butcher to remedy this matter by a different method of cutting? If the tender and tough parts of a beef could be each to itself there would be an advantage to the buyer and no disadvantage to the butcher excepting perhaps his havbutcher excepting perhaps his having to put different prices on the two kinds.

The Frenchman secures tender meat by keeping it till it becomes 'gamey,' but this flavor is not popular with the American taste. Under certain conditions of atmosphere it is possible to make meat tender by keeping it a certain length of time without its developing the objectionable 'gamey' flavor. This may be done in cold storage; it is also done in the Southwest. where the air is very pure and dry. The meat is hung in the open air where it will grow more tender and delicious from day to day without the least flavor of taint; meat is sometimes kept in this way for six weeks. In the many families where neither a cold storage or a northwestern air is available The Frenchman secures tender

families where neither a cold storage or a northwestern air is available tough meat may be at least improved if not made very tender by certainmethods of cooking.

In the case of steak have the meat cut three-fourths or one inch thick; crush the fibers by pounding smartly with a potato masher or other smooth implement; this does not let out the implement; this does not let out the implement; this does not let out the juices so much as chopping or breaking the surface with a meat hammer; brown quickly, turning often, over a bed of good coals, if to be had, if not in a hot skillet; the point is to seal in the juices, not to cook the steak through; lay it in a dry hot skillet, season both sides with butter, nepper and salt; cover closely and skillet, season both sides with butter, pepper and salt; cover closely and set on the back of the stove, where it will keep steaming hot without frying at all; in from thirty to forty minutes, according to the thickness of the steak, it will be done, and if the directions are carefully followed it will prove savory, juicy and tender enough to be eaten with satisfaction. Round and flank steaks are excellent cooked in this way.

For pot roast brown all the cut surfaces in a hot skillet; rub with flour. In a pot containing some boilflour. In a pot containing some boil-ing water put a trivet; on this lay the meat, to keep it out of the water; cover closely and keep at the boiling point till tender. The time will vary with the age and condition of the ani-mal; three to four hours' cooking is with the age and condition of the animal; three to four hours' cooking is sometimes required. When nearly done salt and pepper should be sprinkled over the roast and a bay leaf dropped into the water. Just before dishing lift the roast out of the pot, pour off the gravy and return the roast to the pot with the fat side down; when browned turn the other side to brown: it is then ready for side to brown; it is then ready for the table. Remove the bay leaf from the gravy and pour into the pot after the meat is dished; heat and thicken if necessary.

A New Sugar.

In the markets of Japan large quantities of gelatinous, translucent wafers, called namakouniaku, are sold forfood. These apparently consist of starch paste, but C. Tsuji, of the Imperial college of agriculture at Tokio, finds that they do not give a blue coloration with Todine and hence contain no storely. By these a blue coloration with Jodine and hence contain no starch. By further tests the substance was proven to be mannane, from which the sugar, mannose, can be prepared by the same method that glucose is prepared from starch. The wafers are made from the large brown root of a cultivated plant, Amorphophalius, which is extensively grown in Japan and China. The roots are boiled in water, then ground into a pulp and forced China. The roots are boiled in water, then ground into a pulp and forced through a colander into a large wooden tub which contains an equal quantity of slaked lime and double the amount of water. This mixture is thoroughly kneaded with the feet and then boiled in lime water until it forms the gelatinous mass from which the waters are made, and which is also used to give a better lustre to is also used to give a better lustre to clothes than is possible with laundry starch. Paper treated with this paste of konniaku is used instead of oiled paper for Japanese umbrellas and waterproof cloths. The raw roots are sometimes skinned, sliced, dried and ground into a powder, which may be kept indefinitely before being boiled with lime water to make the paste and wafers. As this mannane forms a nutritious food it must be changed by the digestive fluids into mannose sugar, though the enzymes which digest starch apparently do not affect mannane.
