Mrs. Atwood was notified of her sister's illness, but did not reach her sick bed until she had passed away. Mrs. Atwood's daughter, Mrs. Emma Coon, was visiting in Knoxboro at the time her aunt was taken ill. The funeral was held on Tuesday following the death, and was attended by Mrs. Atwood, and also by her son, E. J. Atwood, of this place.
