New Enterprise at Silver Lake.

A school of physical training is to be conducted at the Silver Lake Assembly next season. A faculty of competent instructors has been secured and the theory and practice of gymnastics will be scientifically taught. In addition to a gymnasium, a one-quarter mile under cycling track is being constructed. The ten acre athletic field furnishes ample space for base ball and a first-class nine will be maintained. Mr. A. B. Burris of Washington College, Chestertown, Md., will captain the nine. Four new tennis courts are being constructed and these, in addition to boating and bathing, comprise the departments of this school.

While there will be classes in heavy gymnastics and athletics, the object of the school is educational, and special provision will be made for those wishing to fit themselves for teaching either in gymnasiums or the public schools. The school opens July 16th and closes Aug. 13th.

Prof. B. B. Brown of Andover and G. W. Brush of Buffalo are the Directors of this school of physical training. Both of these gentlemen are well adapted to the position, and the new enterprise is sure to be successful. Prof. Brown will be glad to furnish information concerning the school to any who may address him.

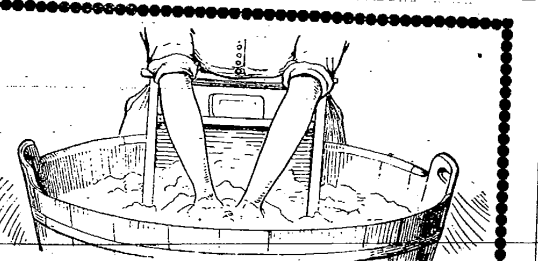
