Whey Butter.
The News is in receipt of a bulletin from the Cornell University Experiment Station, describing the process of extracting butter fat from whey and making the same into butter. The bulletin says:

"January 18th, 1895, we began to run the whey from the cheese making regularly through the separators and we have been successful in securing a large proportion of the fat in the whey in the form of commercial butter of good quality. This butter has been scarcely, if any, inferior to that made from cream, separated from whole milk and it has been printed and sold in the same market with our best butter.

"Upon the average we have been able to secure 2.57 pounds of butter from each 1000 pounds of whey. The whey contained upon the average .25 of 1 per cent. of fat, showing that we have recovered in the form of butter nearly all of the fat in the whey."

The whey was run through a separator, the same as if it were milk, except that it was found necessary, with most separators, to repeat the process, that is, in the first operation about one tenth of the whole bulk was taken from the cream outlet, and this was poured back into the separator to be again run through, the second treatment successfully separating the butter fat from the whey.

The writer of the bulletin seems to be of the opinion that the process of making butter from the whey may be profitably conducted by factories by incurring a small expense for storage tubs for whey, and also for separator, churn, etc.

TWO BIG DAYS.
An Elaborate Program for Allegany's Centennial Celebration.

An outline of the program for the coming Centennial Celebration has been adopted by the Centennial Committee of Wellsville, and pursuant to instructions, the general plan is made public, as follows: The Celebration covers two days—Wednesday and Thursday, June 19th and 20th—and fills every moment of time with something interesting, entertaining and instructive.

WEDNESDAY.
A salute of guns and ringing of bells early Wednesday morning will usher in the two days of demonstration. Later in the forenoon there will be an excursion to Elm Valley, and cradle of Allegany's civilization. Near the confluence of the Elm creek—with Dike's creek may be seen the site of the first white settler's log cabin, the first saw mill and the first tannery in Allegany. Not far distant on a knoll, west of the highway, is the oldest cemetery, where are interred the remains of the pioneer Nathaniel Dike, and also of Daniel Cole, the first white child born in the county. The valley at this point, naturally beautiful, and ripe with historic associations of the struggles of our first white settler, will on a bright day in June certainly well be worth a visit. An oration will be delivered there and the occasion enlivened with music.

On Wednesday afternoon a grand Procession of school children will march to the Wellsville Park, where, after the Invocation and "Address of Welcome," addresses will be delivered and papers read as follows: "Historical Sketch"; Prize essays from the public schools; "Woman's share in our History"; "Our Schools"; and "Agricultural Resources"; music and singing will be interspersed.

In the evening historical papers on "The Bar"; "The Press"; "The Church and its influence"; "Trade, Commerce and Manufacturing"; "Civic Societies" and the "Centennial Poem" will be presented, following which, an out-of-door, if possible, Stereopticon Exhibition, representing the customs of the pioneers and showing pictures of our representative men and historic structures, is a

matter of discussion and is quite likely to be arranged.

THURSDAY.
At 10 o'clock Thursday morning Hon. Frank B. Church, chairman of the Centennial Executive Committee, will introduce an orator who will address the people on "Allegany in the Late Rebellion." It is hoped that all our heroes of the Civil War, irrespective of regiment and whether members of the G. A. R. or not, will make the Centennial an occasion for a Grand Reunion. They will be accorded a place of honor both at the literary exercises and in the great procession. The address on our soldiers will be followed, after music and song, by the "Centennial Oration" which will be delivered, it is hoped, by U. S. Senator Teller, a native of our county. This will conclude the Literary Exercises.

The details of Thursday afternoon's Grand Historical Pageant, in which the Fire Department, Civic Societies, G. A. R. Militia, and the Governor and his Staff are expected to take part, are left for definite determination in the hands of a special committee. The sports, which will probably include races of many kinds, competitive drills—everything and anything for amusement—have also been left in the hands of a special committee for arrangement. It may be said, however, that both the parade and sports will be made as elaborate and entertaining as possible.

A special feature of each day's program will be an exhibition of historical relics; for example, Nathaniel Dike's old account book and bible, mementoes of Maj. Moses VanCampen and Judge Philip Church, spinning wheels, candle sticks, andirons, coal oil lamps, etc. On Thursday evening a display of fireworks will conclude the celebration of Allegany's 100 years of progress.
