Senator Parsons, of Rochester, has introduced an interesting bill in relation to the issue of mileage books by railroad corporations. It provides that every railroad corporation operating a railroad in this state, the line or lines of which are more than one hundred miles in length, and which is authorized by law to charge a maximum fare of more than two cents per mile, and not more than three cents per mile, shall issue mileage books entitling the holder, thereof one thousand, five hundred, or two hundred and fifty miles, as the person applying for such mileage book shall specify, on the line or lines of such railroad, for which the corporation may charge a sum not to exceed two cents per mile. The bill further provides that any railroad corporation which shall refuse to issue a mileage book as required by this act, or shall refuse to accept such mileage book for transportation shall forfeit \$50, to be recovered by the party to which such refusal is made; but no action can be maintained therefor unless commenced within one year after the cause of action occurred. The passage of this bill would be a good act, but a better one would be the passage of a law limiting to two cents per mile the sum that any railroad company could charge, either for long or short distances.

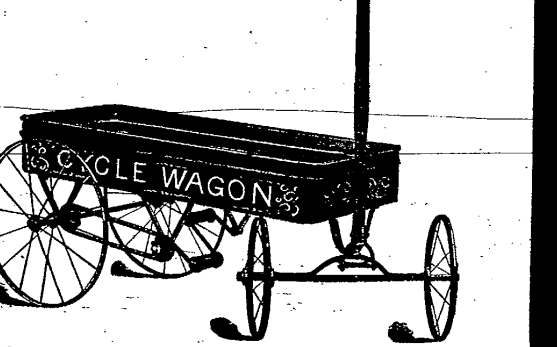
