It was taking curses home to roost when the stockholders in the whiskey trust were "done" out of \$5,000,000, although that did not replace any of the millions which the product of the trust has taken from women and children.

The question of female suffrage in Utah was finally disposed of in the Constitutional Convention on Friday. By a vote of 52 to 42 the Convention refused to refer the matter to a committee to submit the matter in a separate article to the voters, and the clause adopting suffrage as part of the Constitution was adopted 75 to 15.

Assemblyman Robbins of Allegany is said to be assured of a third term, although no previous member has secured a second term from Allegany in forty years. But his prominence as a second term man, at the head of the important committee on codes and general legislation makes him too valuable a man to keep at home. Never before has the county of Allegany gained such a position in the legislature as this year through Assemblyman Robbins. His constituents, who visit Albany, say that they intend to keep him here in the Assembly until an opening can be made on the Supreme Court Bench. —Rochester Post-Express.

After almost a month of deliberation, the United States Supreme Court rendered its decision on Monday in the income tax cases, deciding, by a divided court, the law to be valid, except as regards the income derived from rents and from municipal bonds, on which points the decision was that the tax was unconstitutional. The effect of all the opinions delivered is to show that the court was unanimous in the opinion that the law is unconstitutional as to municipal and State bonds; that Chief Justice Fuller and Justices Field, Gray, Brewer, Brown and Shiras held it to be invalid on incomes derived from rents, and that Justices Harlan and White dissent from this opinion on rents.

The Treasury officials are greatly dispirited over the decision and while admitting that they have no reliable data upon which to form an accurate estimate, they express the belief that the net result of the decision will be a loss of at least 50 per cent. in the receipts which they expected to derive from the income tax. The loss of this revenue, however, is not the only cause of regret among the officials. The fact that the court was divided evenly on the main constitutional question, it is expected, will result in almost endless litigation, thus very materially adding to the expense of collection of the tax.

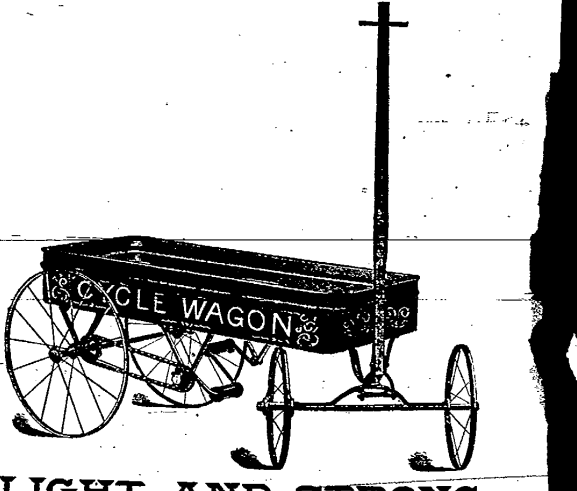

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

Mrs. Mary Clemmer Leavitt attention anew to measures proposed by her in 1890 for remedying the treasuring state of affairs existing in the Congo Free States and West Africa. She believes: "It is as the duty of America and England to forbid the entrance of alcoholic liquors into Africa, east and west, was to forbid the slave trade, equally their duty to enforce the prohibition by a patrol of both coast war vessels. The second measure more effective than that mentioned, is to make alcoholic liquors a trade outside the country where they are manufactured, would protect nearly all weak men (of alcoholic evils) nations."

The bill providing for an investigation of the economic effects of liquor traffic passed Congress, without the special appropriation expenses. Hon. Carroll D. W. will, however, proceed with the investigation as thoroughly as possible under the general appropriation of the Bureau of Labor.
