The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Andover meets the first and third Thursday in each month.

Mrs. Mary Clemmer Leavitt calls attention anew to measures proposed by her in 1890 for remedying the distressing state of affairs existing in the Congo Free States and Western Africa. She believes: "It is as much the duty of America and England to forbid the entrance of alcoholics into equatorial Africa, east and west, as it was to forbid the slave trade, and equally their duty to enforce the prohibition by a patrol of both coasts by war vessels. The second measure, and more effective than that already mentioned, is to make alcoholics contraband of trade outside the country where they are manufactured. This would protect nearly all weak or ignorant (of alcoholic evils) nation."

The bill providing for an investigation of the economic effects of the liquor traffic passed Congress, but without the special appropriation for expenses. Hon. Carroll D. Wright will, however, proceed with the investigation as thoroughly as possible, under the general appropriation for the Bureau of Labor.

The statistics of every State show a greater amount of crime and misery attributable to the use of ardent spirits obtained at these retail liquor saloons than any other source."

According to the report of the State Assessor, the valuation of property in Maine has increased since 1892 by over ten million dollars. A large proportion of the growth in value can be directly traced to the salutary effect of the prohibitory law.

NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Rev. F. W. Beecher has accepted the rectorship of St. Paul's church of Angelica.

Fifty thousand brook trout fry were placed in the brooks near Wellsville this week.

The Wooster furniture factory, of Canaseraga, destroyed by the great fire, will not be rebuilt.

Joseph Demmer, station agent at Belmont is very ill and his friends despair of his recovery.

D. D. Babcock, one of Hornellsville's best-known citizens, died last Thursday after an extended illness.

The revised list of losses in the Canaseraga fire foot up \$175,000, with about \$99,900 insurance.

The Allegany County Sunday School Association will hold its annual convention at Wellsville on May 14 and 15.

Under the influence of the compulsory school law the attendance in Cattaraugus county has been increased 700.

The oldest bridge across the Genesee river is at Genesee. It is of lattice work resting on wooden piers. Although built in 1826, it is apparently as sound as ever.

Principal Armstrong is in receipt of overtures to take a position in the schools of Syracuse. Happily there is a string to the proposition that may result in his retention here.—Friendship Register.

The name of the postoffice, Stannards Corners, has been changed to Stanards, N. Y., and is now spelled with one "n." This will prove a great convenience to those who are compelled to write the address. The newly appointed postmaster, B. C. Cole, has already assumed the position.

F. H. and C. W. Goodyear have purchased 4,000 acres of Potter County timber land from William Dent, and the timber and hemlock bark on another tract of 4,000 acres. The price paid was \$150,000. The timber lands of Potter county are now practically in the hands of the Goodyears.

The farm of Rufus Powell, on a little by-road, two miles east of Somerset, near Lockport, has a gruesome record. Within the last three decades no less than three suicides have occurred there. The last was that of 14-year-old William Carpenter, who was found by his employer hanging in the barn on Wednesday morning last. The two previous suicides were in a manner responsible for the one last week. The young man had been at work on this farm for three years, and brooded over the two former occurrences until his mind became unbalanced and he hung himself in a barn.

According to a law passed in 1891, each town building new bridges was to receive from the county one-sixth of 1 per cent. of assessed valuation of the town, the same to apply on the building of the bridges. This amounted to quite a large sum, as the following figures show: Belfast leads with \$2,400; Hume, about \$1,800; New Hudson, \$175; Centerville, \$375; Allen, \$105; Amity, \$700; Scio, \$100; Friendship, \$1,500; Wirt \$450; Willing, \$340; Bolivar, \$210, which makes a total of \$8,155 to be paid back to the towns. There were several towns that had small bills and did not present them, also some towns failed to get them before the Supervisors and consequently will not be able to secure a proportion of the money used in building. Caneadea has about \$1,500 which was not presented in time, the law being repealed a few weeks ago. The attorney-general has given his opinion that all bills which were properly presented previous to the repealing of the law were valid and should be allowed.
