> According to a law passed in 1891 each town building new bridges was to receive from the county one sixth of per cent, of assessed valuation of the town, the same to apply on the building of the bridges. This amounted to quite a large sum, as the following figures show: Belfast leads with \$2,400: Hume about \$1,800; New Hudson, \$175; Centerville, \$375; Allen, \$105; Amity, \$700; Scio, \$100; Friendship, \$1,500; Wirt \$450; Willing, \$340; Bolivar, \$210, which makes a total of \$8,155 to be paid back to the towns. There were several towns that had small bills and failed to get them before the Supervis-ors and consequently will not be able to secure a proportion of the money used in building.
