

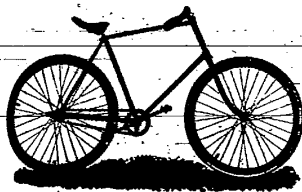

## Death of Mrs. S. H. Hale.

A telegram was received by M. H. Harman last Friday morning announcing the death of his mother, Mrs. S. K. Hale, at Los Angeles, Cal.

Mrs. Hale was 71 years of age last June. She had been in feeble health for many months, and about the first of last December went to California to spend the winter, in the hope that the mild climate of that region would prove beneficial to her health. The change evidently did not produce the desired effect. Doubtless the long journey was more than Mrs. Hale, in her enfeebled condition, could endure without great fatigue, and since she has been in California letters received by her friends here have not been reassuring. However, for a few weeks past, the reports have been of a more cheerful nature, and Mrs. Hale's condition was understood to be materially improved, so much so in fact, that she contemplated returning home at an early date. Her daughter, Mrs. C. A. Dolson of Hornellsville, had made preparations to go to California and return with her mother. She was to have started last Friday, the day the telegram came announcing the sad event. The probability is that Mrs. Hale was taken suddenly worse and failed rapidly until her death, which speedily followed.

The deceased was born in Genesee, N. Y. She was married to J. J. Harman of Almond in 1844, and the couple removed to Andover the same year. They were the parents of seven children, two of whom, M. H. Harman, Esq., of this place, and Mrs. C. A. Dolson of Hornellsville, are now living. Dr. Harman was a physician of large practice and acknowledged ability, and afterward one of the most successful of Andover's merchants. The family name of Harman is perhaps as widely known throughout this section as any other that could be mentioned. Dr. Harman died in 1884. Mrs. Hale has lived in this place continuously ever since coming here in 1844. She was dearly beloved by the members of her family, and highly respected by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances, each of whom sincerely wished that the change of climate might result in a marked improvement in her health, and that she might remain many years to enjoy the companionship of her loved ones.

The remains left Los Angeles Monday, and upon arrival here, which will be about a week from the time of departure, funeral services will be held.

## Sad Death of an Estimable Young Lady.

Nora E., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Bundy of this town, died on Monday, April 15th, 1895, aged 18 years. She had been ill with pneumonia for about a week. For a few days previous to being attacked by this disease she had not been well, but no serious results had been anticipated. A week ago Monday night she was taken violently ill and her disease soon developed into pneumonia. From the first the chances of recovery were very slight, and as the disease progressed it became apparent that the best of medical skill and the tenderest care would prove of no avail. The announcement of her death, however, came as a severe shock to every person in this community, as all had hoped that the malady might yet take a favorable turn.

The deceased was an exceptionally popular and estimable young lady. Her friends were numbered by scores. Every acquaintance was an admirer of her many excellent qualities and her true Christian character. She was a devoted daughter and sister, a firm friend, an agreeable companion, a kind associate. Above and beyond all else, she was pure in heart; and standing as we do in the shadow of this great grief, sympathizing and sorrowing with the bereaved ones in their affliction, there yet come to all who knew her spotless life, the comforting words of Him who "spoke as never man spake,"

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

The funeral services were held this afternoon at the Baptist church, the attendance being so great that the auditorium could not accommodate the concourse of mourning and sympathizing friends. The services were conducted by Rev. Wayne Brewster, assisted by Rev. J. M. Leach of this place and Rev. J. Kenyon of Independence.
