The Spanish control all telegraphic news sent from Cuba, but the revolutionists get a letter giving their side of things over to Florida occasionally. The real state of affairs is probably between the two.

Allegany's Member of Assembly.

The Buffalo Express, in an article reviewing the work done by members of the State Legislature from Western New York, has the following concerning Hon. Fred A. Robbins:

"No list of 'ablest men in the House' would be complete without the name of Fred A. Robbins of Angelica, who has come to the front during his second term as Allegany's representative. Mr. Robbins is the acknowledged legal authority on bills in the House, as Mr. Pound is in the Senate. He has made legislation his business while here, and has spotted more bad bills than any other man in the Assembly. He has done splendid work as chairman of the Committee on Codes, and any bill he has chosen to oppose upon the floor has generally been lost. Three local bills, all of which are now laws, were offered by Mr. Robbins. One authorized Canadea to issue bonds for local improvements; one corrected defective assessments in Belfast and one empowered the Amity town board to make a bigger cemetery in that place. Among his bills that have passed is a Code amendment aiming to relieve grand juries from the consideration of many petty cases by permitting magistrates to try all cases of misdemeanors when the defendant elects to be so tried. Another Code amendment enables district attorneys to subpoena witnesses in any part of the state without waiting to get an order from the court. The law relative to wills is amended so that all bequests to charitable or religious societies by a person leaving a husband, wife, parent or child, shall be void unless the will is executed two months before the testator dies. Mr. Robbins considers this the most important of his bills, because it puts an end to technical evasions of existing laws. It prevents the giving away a large sum of money to strangers by persons who, in their last illness, are influenced to forget the claims of their own kindred. An important general bill revises the Code of Civil Procedure relative to habeas corpus, mandamus and similar proceedings. Its object is to condense and simplify the Code in these respects. One interesting bill, which died in committee, put the taxation of trust companies upon the same basis as banks. The trust companies had a bigger pull with the committee than had Mr. Robbins.

In politics, the member from Allegany has been a Mortontite. He opposed the Sanger ballot bill, and was not in Albany when the telephone vote was taken. He did not dodge, however, being one of half a dozen members who were absent because of illness or committee work on the day that Mr. Pier tried to put the House on record upon the question of cheaper phones."

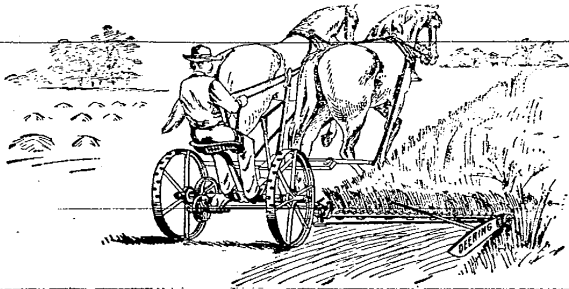

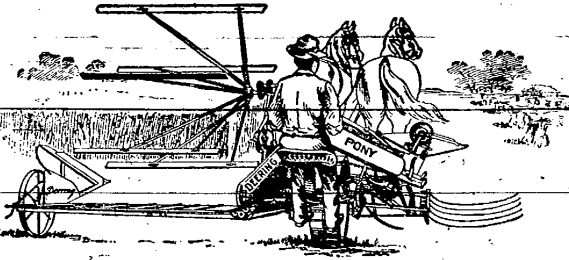

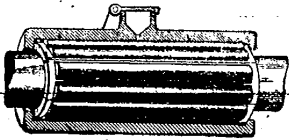


The Deering Roller-bearing Ideal Mower.
