Forty years ago she went forth from her comfortable home in England, not as a mere nurse for the wounding and dying soldiers of Crimea, but as a fearless organizer of a great field hospital system, which the British War Office authorities, staff officers and generals had looked upon as a mere matter of afterthought in the preliminary arrangements of one of the most difficult campaigns in history. She was bitterly condemned by the anti-woman conservatives of her time, and even Mary Russell Mitford called Miss Nightingale and her associate nurses "notoriety-seeking ladies;" but to day everyone recognizes the value of their work.

The superintendent of a New York hospital says: "Tobacco has done more to precipitate mind into the vortex of the insane than spirituous liquors."

Here the business sessions will be held continuing for two or three days, the editors and their wives being the guests of the Horicon Improvement Company, which has generously tendered hotel-accommodations, free of charge, as long as the Association desires to remain.
