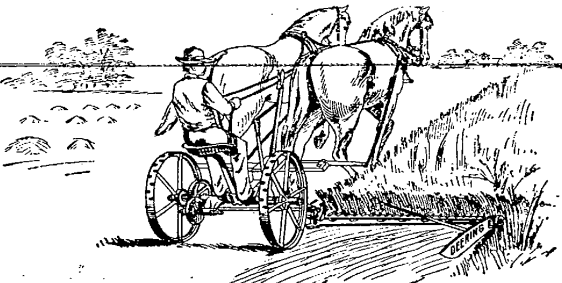

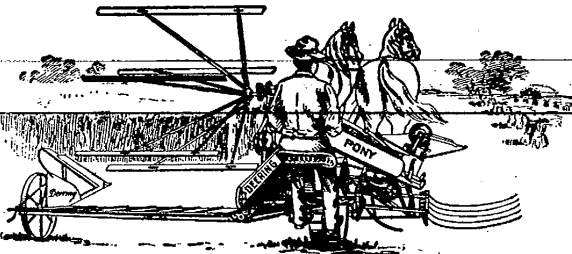

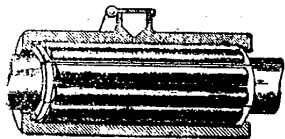


The Deering Roller-bearing Ideal Mower.
