**BIG CELEBRATION!**  
ONE HUNDRETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SETTLEMENT OF ALLEGANY COUNTY.  
Distinguished Speakers, Grand Pageant, Historical Museum, Stereopticon Exhibition, Hose, Foot, Bicycle and all Sorts of Races.  
Wednesday and Thursday, June 26th and 27th, "Grand Old Allegany" will celebrate the centennial of its settlement at Wellsville, N. Y. The program is long and elaborate and will afford one of the most entertaining and costly celebrations ever attempted in Western New York.

Historical papers and addresses will be delivered and the school children's parade will take place Wednesday, and in the evening there will be an out-of-door, if possible, stereopticon exhibition, illustrating the progress of the county from the chaotic condition of 1795 to the present. Plenty of the best band music will be in attendance both days.

THURSDAY THE BIG DAY.  
Thursday morning at 10 o'clock the centennial oration will be delivered by Captain R. H. Pratt of the Carlisle Indian school, Poem by Hon. H. L. Gordon, the Soldiers' Oration by Hon. E. W. Hatch, and addresses from Senator Teller, Congressman Sibley and other distinguished natives of the county.

**GRAND PARADE AND SPORTS.**  
The Grand Procession Thursday afternoon will be in five sections, each a parade in itself. The historical pageant will splendidly illustrate the evolution of the county's civilization on a series of floats which have been prepared at great expense. The County G. A. R. Association of 1,000 or more members, the Civic Societies, the Firemen, an Industrial Display, etc., etc. constitute the other sections of the great exhibition.  
After the parade, a program of sports, hose, foot, bicycle and other races, old fashioned games, etc., etc., will take place on the Fair Ground, admission free.

**HISTORICAL MUSEUM.**  
A feature of remarkable interest will be the Historical Museum for which the ladies have secured the entire ground and upper floors of Wellsville's commodious City Hall. This display of interesting relics will doubtless be the largest and best of its kind ever collected in Western New York.

**Court News.**  
Supreme court convened at Belmont June 10, Judge Spring presiding.  
The first case called was that of Chester D. Mills vs. Geo. B. Gordon, to recover possession of lands and damages. Verdict for plaintiff giving possession of land and \$35 damages.  
Electa A. Dyke vs. Reuben Doty, an action to recover the value of oil lands. It is a case of long standing, but was finally taken from the jury and referred to Judge Spring.  
Divorces were granted in the cases of May F. Quinn vs. James L. Quinn, and Melvin Atwell vs. Jennie Atwell. The last named was an Andover suit, and attorney Crayton L. Earley had charge of the plaintiff's case.  
Rufus M. Watson vs. Oscar A. Fuller, tried and judgment granted for plaintiff of \$35 and possession of land.  
A Miner Wellman vs. Farli Reddy, tried and judgment for plaintiff for \$244.50.  
Helen M. Brown vs. N. B. Sherman as Sheriff and Chas. Dow, tried, judgment for plaintiff for \$400.  
Lewis H. Hewitt vs. John Hubble, judgment for plaintiff for \$40.

**THE MASONS.**  
A Few Facts About this Great Organization Membership, Finances, etc.

The Free and Accepted, Masons of the state of New York, recently met in annual convention for the one hundred and fourteenth time. The convention was held in the famous Masonic temple in New York and lasted three days. No less than 734 subordinate lodges were represented at the meeting. The fact that there is not a dormant lodge in this state, and returns have been received from every one of 734 chartered lodges shows the activity and prosperity of the ancient craft throughout the jurisdiction. The increase of membership, while not as large as in some previous years, is regarded as healthful over 2,000 members having been added to the rolls, making 88,573 Free Masons in good standing in this state on Dec 31, 1894.

During the past year four new lodges were formed under dispensation. The report of the Grand Treasurer showed that the Grand Lodge is in an excellent condition and that there is a surplus of \$50,000 on hand, which under the rules, will be turned over to the Masonic Home and School fund. The Hall and Asylum Fund is also in a flourishing condition, and the trustee of the fund report a surplus of \$35,000 in the general fund and \$168,000 in the reserve fund. There are now 125 persons in the home and school at Utica.

After the ceremony a sumptuous repast was spread, to which all did ample justice. The presents were numerous and costly, including nearly everything in the line of furniture, silverware, china, table linen, etc., that the young people will need to begin housekeeping. The happy couple left on train 12 Wednesday evening for Albany; thence they went down the Hudson river to New York and Ocean Grove, where they will spend a few days. The best wishes of a large circle of friends will follow them through life and ever rejoice at their prosperity. They will be at home to all their friends after July 1st, at Wellsville.
