Editor Fries and the Women.

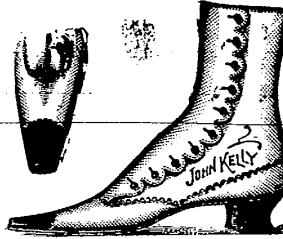
