The varieties planted are about as follows: 10,000 Mountain Rose, 15,000 Crosby, 8,000 Oldmixion, 5,000 Lady Ingold, 50,000 Elberts, 10,000 Stump lagold, 50,000 Elberta, 10,000 Stump and 2,000 of other varieties, largely for the purpose of testing their suitability for that section. The Lady Ingold is a yellow peach of the Crawford type, but a better shipper, and is also said to be more productive.

In setting out this immense orchard the trees were subjected to the severest pruning we ever before heard of. The top was pruned to a bare pole and then shortened, while the roots were cut to mere stumps of 1½

roots were cut to mere stumps of 1½ inches in length; yet such was the effect of that flavoring soil and climate that trees thus planted on February 1. ruary 5 were on June 7 of the same season well supplied with symmetri-cal tops and roots.

Cricket on the Hearth.

Miss Edith Carrington, who writes Miss Edith Carrington, who writes so instructively and so interestingly on natural history subjects, gives a very intelligible description of the familiar insect, the house cricket. The chirping noise which is the main characteristic of this beetle, is made by the male insect for the purpose of serenading his sweetheart. Having no wice he uses his wings, and or serenading his sweetheart. Having no voice, he uses his wings, and in a most admirable manner. Beneath the gray scales on its back the cricket has a couple of pairs of extremely lovely wings. Through the upper pair of these, near the middle, run two stiffish nervures. which are

tremely lovely wings. Infroughter upper pair of these, near the middle, run two stiffish nervures, which are hard and resemble little files. When the cricket wishes to make himself agreeable he arises his wings, bends his body slightly forward and quickly rubs his files against each other. The sound is made greatly louder by a flat plate on each wing, which, acting somewhat like the parchment of a drum, causes the rasping of the files to be heard far and wide. The female cricket has no musical instrument of her own, and she cannot reply to the chirping; but, though dumb, she possesses a fine pair of ears, which are situated not in her head but her legs. The cricket, being partly a burrowing insect, has a protective mask, which eovers the face; and, being hinged like the visor worn by a knight of old, can be litted at will. lifted-at will.

Beneath it the cricket's tongue appears, a curious kidney-shaped organ of elaborate structure, which acts like a sponge, and enables its owner to suck up the moisture it needs. Its food is slender and consists of grains of flour or crumbs too small for the broom to remove, and where crickets are numerous they are useful as scavengers in removing dust.
