The funds were not forthcoming and the deputy sheriff took him to Belmont yesterday afternoon. In this case, as in nearly all similar ones, it is the family of the offender who suffer most in mind and body, and it would afford some satisfaction to those concerned if the man who sold liquor to a person like John Wilcox could be found out and made to serve a month in prison for every heartpang the affair has brought to the highly respected members of the family.
