Firemen's Convention.

The second annual convention and parade of the Allegany County Firemen's Association, will be held in Friendship August 7th and 8th. The attendance this year promises to be larger than ever before. The principal event for the first day, after the convention and election are over is a free-for-all horse race, purse \$100, \$50 and \$25. There is no entrance fee. The famous Centrals of Bradford, Abbotts of Salamanca, Spring Hills of Titusville, flunsters of Union City, Whipples of Cuba and other crack teams will compete. Two bicycle races will be run: scratch, prize \$12 gold badge; half-mile, scratch, prize \$8 silver cup. These races are to Class A riders residing in Allegany county. The parade will take place August 8th, and 50 companies and 20 bands will take part in it. The sports will consist of a 200-yard horse race, purses \$40 and \$20; prize-drill, purses \$20 and \$10; hook and ladder race, purses \$10 and \$5; 200-yard foot race, purses \$10 and \$5. With the exception of the foot race, the second day's sports are open to Allegany County firemen only. The entries for all the races close August 5th. Friendship business men have contributed liberally toward the entertainment fund. Where to find places for the firemen to sleep has been a puzzle. Two thousand cots have been ordered. They will be placed in private houses about the village. The president, H. A. Corbin, and secretary H. F. Wells, are hard at work preparing for the convention and are ably assisted by all the firemen of that place.

People along the river from Belfast to Wellsville are quite sanguine of the success of the new railroad project. When completed, it will form a continuous line from Rochester to Wellsville, making Wellsville in even closer connection with Rochester than Olean now is, and giving the northern towns of the county direct communication with the county seat.

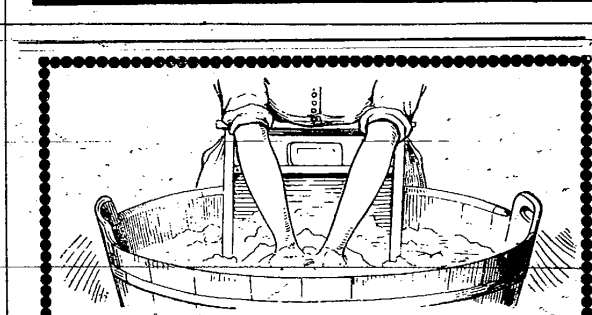
At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1895, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1895: RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived. RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1. RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for, not less than 5 cents per line.
