The following is the result of an analysis of a cigarette, made recently by a physician: "The tobacco was found to be strongly impregnated with opium, while the wrapper, which was warranted to be rice paper, was proved to be the most ordinary quality of paper whitened with arsenic. The two poisons combined were present in sufficient quantities to create in the smoker a habit of using opium without his being aware of it, his craving for which can only be satisfied by an incessant consumption of cigarettes." These facts would be sufficient to stop the manufacture of anything less insidious in its influence. But smokers will smoke on to the death.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

The colored Masons of New York state will hold their fourth annual convention in Olean August 13.

The reunion of the 136th Regiment, New York Volunteers, of which many Alleganians were members, will be held at Nunda on September 3rd.

Canaseraga will vote on the question of water works on Aug. 10th. \$14,000 are wanted to build the system. Pure spring water can be had in abundance.

The Whitesville Oil and Gas Company has been organized with E. H. Heselbine President, A. D. Howe Secretary, and G. H. Chapin Treasurer. A test well will soon be located.

Work is being rapidly pushed on the macadam road between Alfred and Alfred Station, and plans have been made for a new station, which the Alfred people feel encouraged to think will soon be built.

An exchange says that a new law, in effect August 1st, is expected to weed out incompetent dentists. The diplomas of some of the so-called dental schools will not be sufficient evidence of the holder's right to practice.

Geo. S. Jones, of Friendship, a man about 50 years old, fell from a scaffolding on McKee's new house in that place, one day last week, and striking on his head and shoulders, died in a few moments. He was a relative of McKee's and was painting. He leaves a wife.

A Jamestown special says that Chartauqua is to have a new building, to cost \$25,000, and it will be called the Hall of Christ. It will stand upon a knoll in the western part of the grounds on the site now occupied by Normal Hall. The building will be entirely devoted to the study of Christ as a factor in history.

A Jamestown dispatch says: During the past few days several valuable horses owned by Frederick Sears, of Fentonville, have died in the pasture. Many more are sick and likely to die. Dr. Thomas Meredith, a veterinary surgeon of this city, thinks the animals are afflicted with anthrax, a very serious disease, which is pronounced incurable. Mr. Sears conducts public pastures and takes care of many horses. The disease is malignant and the neighborhood is alarmed for the fear of its spreading. It is thought to be the result of drinking bad water. When attacked with the disease the animals roll about the pasture and seem to be in great pain. They live but a short time after they show the first signs of being sick.

A church that will fold up like a voting-booth is the invention of a Western man and one of the Rochester churches is thinking of investing. It is said a church to seat 500 people will cost \$500. The church building is constructed entirely of steel and iron. The frame work is of steel and the siding and roofing is of corrugated iron. Thus the building is entirely fireproof. When taken apart its sections measure only 7x8 feet. It therefore folds up, as the inventor says, into very compact sections. The whole thing is constructed so that it will be very cool in the summer and warm in the winter. In the summer the flooring can be taken out so that the edifice can be placed on the green sward. In this shape the edifice might be said to be in the shape of a steel tent. Of course in the winter time, when the flooring is laid and stoves are put in, the building is warm and cosy. If it is desired, it can also be placed on a regular foundation. It is said that two men can put the church up in a day. It is 17 feet high to the peak of the roof.

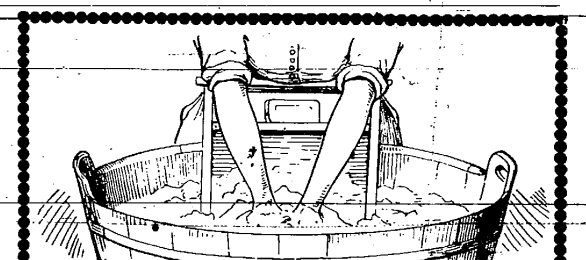

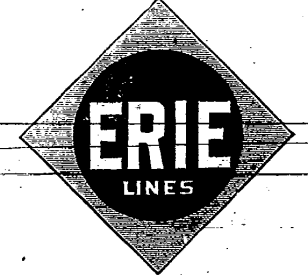
