There were 46 new oil wells completed in the Allegany field during the month of July, the largest number completed in one month in over eight years. There were five dry holes and four gas wells. The total new production for July was 261 barrels. The only surprise of the month was the Willetts estate No. 10, on lot 22; Genesee, which started off at 50 barrels. On August 1st there were 44 wells drilling and 16 rigs under way. The daily production of the Allegany field is now a trifle above 2,000 barrels.
