The Firemen's Convention.

The second annual convention of the volunteer firemen of Allegany County was held at Friendship last Wednesday and Thursday. Seventeen of the eighteen companies in the county were represented. The business meeting was called to order by President H. A. Corbin. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$60.25. It was decided to hold the next convention in Cuba. F. B. Sibley of Cuba was elected president for the coming year, and O. O. Amsden of Cuba, secretary, after which the business meeting adjourned.

The Friendship and Bradford ball teams played a five-inning game, which was won by Friendship by a score of 15 to 3.

In the free-for-all hose race four teams contested. The Whipples of Cuba covered the 200 yards and laid the 200 feet of hose in 32 seconds. The Abbots of Salamanca and the Acmes of Olean were tied for second place in 33 seconds, and the Dukes of Wellsville made the run in 36 seconds. The purses were \$100, \$50 and \$25.

There were two starters in the mile scratch bicycle race: prize, \$12 gold medal. Jesse Ostrander of Wellsville was first, Morris Gale of Wellsville second and F. C. Carter of Belmont third. Time 2:44 1/2.

The half mile scratch was won by Ostrander of Wellsville, Carter of Belmont second. Time, 1:16; prize, \$8 silver cup.

The final business meeting of the convention was held Thursday night, presided over by President H. A. Corbin. It was decided to create a fund for establishing and maintaining a home for indigent Allegany county firemen by creating life memberships. Any fireman in good standing may become a life member by paying \$2 annual dues. The treasury balance of \$80 was voted to be the nucleus of the proposed fund, which will be taken care of by three trustees. The trustees elected, were W. H. Crandall, F. B. Chamberlain, Edward Williams. Thos. Sweeney of Wellsville was elected secretary for the ensuing year. The new executive committee is as follows: B. S. Dunn, Robert O'Donnell, E. A. Crumb, J. B. Jennings, P. H. Kelley, Edward Gocum, T. J. Rose, J. J. O'Connor and A. D. Howe.

The parade of firemen occurred on Thursday afternoon, and was a grand affair.

The prize drill, prize \$20, was awarded to the Citizens' Hose Company of Andover. The judges were Capt. Avery McDougall of Hornellsville and Capt. R. H. Franchot of Olean. The 200 yard foot race was won by W. A. Wood of Andover in 23 seconds, Bert Hanks of Wellsville second. The 200-yard hose race, prizes \$40 and \$20, was contested by the Duke Hose of Wellsville and the Whipple Hose of Cuba, and resulted in a tie; time 34 seconds. The hook and ladder 150-yard race, purse \$10 and \$5, was won by the Loveridge Hooks of Cuba in 27 3/5 seconds. The Emeralds of Wellsville were second. They made the run in 30 seconds.

It cost the people of Friendship over \$1,000 to entertain the visiting firemen, and they did it in admirable style. Not a single accident occurred during the two days and good order prevailed.

The Citizens' Hose Company of this village won the prize drill for the second time, without opposition. As was the case last year, other companies were prepared to enter the contest, but withdrew after our boys had given their exhibition. This is the best possible testimony to the fact that Andover has no equal in the county in the military drill. Every citizen is proud of the Citizens' record, and we are all ready to "whoop 'er up" at any time for the drillers and their drill master, J. F. Barrett.

A newspaper correspondent has been permitted to scan some few pages of the manuscript for the new Allegany county history, from which he learned that the amount of taxes raised in the county in 1841 was \$10,823.07. Twenty years later it had reached the sum of \$50,835.72, and in 1890 \$152,784.42 were raised. From the same source he learned that from 1808 to 1815 inclusive, 1746 wolves and panthers were killed at a cost to the county and State of \$26,679. Only three panthers were reported. This is quite a wolf story, but is gathered from the records. In 1845 was the last appearance, on the records at least, of wolves in Allegany.
