To Parents and Students of Andover Union School.

One of the chief aims of our school hereafter will be to give a course of study that will prepare the student for college, and the following announcement is made to further that aim.

Inasmuch as it is conceded by all educators that there is a certain discipline of mind obtained in a college course not obtainable in the Academy, the High School, or even in the Normal School, and inasmuch as the Faculty and Board of Education desire to raise the already high standard of our school, and to incite a desire to prepare for a higher education, the following proposition is placed before the would be pupils of the Andover Union School and Academy.

The first young man or woman, who at the Andover Union School begins preparation for college and satisfactorily completes the course, shall be provided with a sixty dollar scholarship for the University of Rochester and Vassar College respectively. Should there be several who complete the course at the same time, the awards will be made to the ones having the highest standing.

Neither college is denominational. The atmosphere is of the highest moral character. The instructors in both institutions are as good as the country affords.

It is hoped that you will avail yourself of this opportunity.

The following is a course of study from which classes will be formed as far as possible. The subjects in italics are those required in preparation for college for the degree of A. B. Those wishing to prepare for the Latin Scientific Course can take German instead of Greek.

Students will be allowed to select their own subjects as far as possible. It will be well to show this course of study to parents and consult with them.

There are to be several new features introduced during the year that will be advantageous to students, and we feel sure that you will be well pleased with the result of the year's labor.

School opens Sept. 2, at which time we shall be glad to welcome you.

ANOTHER GOOD OIL WELL.
It is on Ellery Updyke's Farm and the Mutual Company Owns It.

Last week the Mutual Gas Company finished another well on the farm of Ellery Updyke, on the Greenwood road. The well was shot last Wednesday, about 10 o'clock a. m., and at seven o'clock the same evening it had produced about eighteen barrels of oil. It is now producing upwards of ten barrels a day.

This company is now drilling another well on J. J. Warfield's farm, and will soon begin one on the farm of Benj. Warfield, who lives a short distance east of the line between Andover and Greenwood.

The Law Will Be Enforced.

An exchange says that a new form of mileage books will be put on sale August 20th on the Erie railroad. The books are of an iron-clad kind, having undoubtedly been arranged with a view of shutting out and abolishing the traffic heretofore indulged in by ticket scalpers along the Erie.

The books to be put on sale will have to be ordered three days in advance by the applicant, who will deposit \$20 with the local ticket agent, receiving therefor a receipt for the same. The agent will then order the book from the General Passenger Agent, Mr. D. I. Roberts, at New York. The books will have to be signed by the individual purchasing the same, and when presented for a passage ticket to the ticket agent, the signature on the book must correspond with the signature written in the presence of the agent, or no ticket will be issued for mileage coupons; also, the signature must be written by the passenger in the presence of the conductor, and if a doubt exists as to the genuineness of the book, and if the signatures do not agree, conductors will take up the book and cause the passenger to pay fare to his destination. The books must be presented to ticket agents for passage tickets, and for each mile desired to be traveled, a coupon is abstracted.

A Serious, Yet Fortunate Accident.

Miss Flora Bundy of this place was severely injured last Saturday. She, in company with Mrs. L. C. Van Fleet, also of this place, was visiting relatives of Mrs. Van Fleet, in the town of New Hudson, this county. The two ladies started to drive to Black Creek Saturday, intending to go from there by rail to the Cuba camp meeting. The horse was being driven by a boy about 15 years old. As they were descending a steep hill some part of the harness became disarranged, and the horse took fright and started to run. Mrs. Van Fleet grasped the reins and turned the horse aside into a meadow. When crossing a ditch between the road and the field Miss Bundy was thrown from the carriage and sustained a great number of severe bruises upon many parts of her body.

Medical assistance was procured as soon as possible, and it was not until the next day that the full extent of the injuries could be determined. Fortunately, it was decided that nothing worse than a severe general shaking-up, and the bruises above described, had resulted from the accident. These, however, are quite enough, but it was fortunate that no greater calamity resulted. If the horse had kept its course down the hill it is impossible to state what would have been the result, but doubtless all the occupants of the carriage would have suffered, probably to a much greater extent than did Miss Bundy. The injured lady was brought home yesterday, and is now confined to the bed at the home of L. C. Van Fleet, where she is as comfortable as possible under the circumstances. Her many friends hope for her speedy recovery as is possible.
