Of Interest to the Citizens of Andover.

Some few weeks past, the people of Andover were very much interested in the political aspect of the town, and all looked forward with no small degree of excitement to the holding of the County Convention in this city. I presume there was scarcely a man or woman but that had some interest in the matter pro or con, and was perfectly willing to express opinions. Such an attitude speaks well for a town. It indicates that the people are alive to the welfare of their community.

Next Monday another event takes place here that is as important as any political occurrence. It is the opening of the Union School.

Every man, woman and child ought to be interested, yes, intensely interested in his school; for it belongs to every individual in the place. From its doors go forth the men and women who, in many instances, will become citizens of Andover. What sort of citizens they will make depends in a great measure upon the education that they receive here in this school.

Youth is the formation period. Character is moulded, disposition fixed by the environment of youth. Every father desires his son to be a manly man. Every mother wishes her daughter to be a true woman. One day in seven is given to religious training, but neither priest nor minister can yield his influence through the rest of the week; and also the thought of being preached to is distasteful to many a youth who otherwise is very sensible. Religion bears no part in the school training. Ethics, pure and simple, is made the criterion of deportment. High and lofty aims are continually before the pupils, and he is incited to his best efforts to make of himself a man, able to take a broad, true view of life; a man who will make a good citizen with ability to participate in public affairs.

Many, perhaps, on account of circumstances, will be prevented from gaining any higher education than is afforded here. Why not offer all that is possible? Why not urge the student to complete such a course of study as shall open up a wider field of knowledge and prepare him to continue his education at some higher seat of learning, should he ever have the opportunity?

It shall be the policy of the school during the coming year to do this. Those who have thoughts of preparing for College will be urged to start such a course. Those wishing to enter a Normal school will be urged to take such studies as will enable an ordinary student to finish at a Normal school in one year and a half. Those who have no thoughts of going elsewhere to complete their education, will be urged to make the best of the opportunities offered at the Academy.

No expenses or changes in text-books have been advocated by the principal that did not seem necessary for the welfare of the school.

No one thing ought to demand the attention of the citizens of Andover more than the public school. We believe we have a good faculty, a good student-body, a good school, yet by the hearty co-operation of citizens, students and faculty, we can make the school still better. We feel confident that we shall have this unity of interest, and shall open our school next Monday sure of a profitable and successful year.

L. C. Van Fleet Nominated for County Judge.

The Prohibition County Convention was held in Maple Grove, this village, on Tuesday. The following nominations were made:

After the Convention adjourned, the audience listened to an able address by Prof. A. A. Hopkins of Harriman, Tenn. Mr. Hopkins has been heard in Allegany County several times before, and is regarded as one of the ablest advocates of Prohibition.
